

Mrs. H. Morgan Returns from National Meet

Mrs. Harry Morgan returned Sunday from a trip to Atlantic City, N. J., where she represented Oregon at the National Convention of Business and Professional Women's clubs. She has the following to say about her trip:

"My first stop was at Chicago, where I took the South Shore tour. Also met my husband's uncle, D. D. Jones, who is with the Butler Brothers. Second stop was at Washington, D. C. Tours included a trip down the Potomac to Mt. Vernon, George Washington's home; a visit to Robert E. Lee's home, Arlington cemetery and tomb of unknown soldier (which is constantly guarded by sentries, two hours on and two hours off); a visit to the White House which included the privilege of entering some of the living quarters, gold room, blue room, red room, and also saw the piano. Went through the capitol building and saw the new supreme court building.

"I attended an all-states banquet at the Mayflower hotel, sponsored by the B. P. W. club of District of Columbia, with the Hon. Frances Perkins as the guest of honor. From there I went to Atlantic City for the eight-day national convention, which was held in the Atlantic auditorium, with a seating capacity of 40,000. Aside from the convention, which was very interesting, the highlights of this famous resort were the board walk, colorful beach umbrellas (rows and rows of them) and the hotels.

"At the close of the convention I went to New York, where I met my cousins, Mr. and Mrs. Elmer Ives, Detroit, who were on a vacation trip. We took an all-day trip, visiting Radio City, Rockefeller Center, Chinatown with its mission and joss house, the Little Church Around the Corner, Wall Street, Grant's Tomb, Trinity church with its cemetery, the Grand Central station, the Rockefeller restaurant, Harlem Fourteenth street (which is the longest street in the world) and lunch on the 8th floor of the Empire State building and saw New York from the 102nd floor. Saw the aquarium, which is one of the largest in the world. Crossed the Hudson to get a "close-up" view of the Goddess of Liberty. Visited Coney Island; heard a broadcast in N. B. C. studios. The Good Time Society, made up of colored people, sang Shirley Temple in "Wee Willie Winkie" at Roxy theatre.

"Made a tour of inspection on the British liner, the Queen Mary, largely of sea-going vessels. Here, by chance, I met Mrs. Vic MacKenzie and her guests, Miss Wilma MacKenzie and Mrs. Meda Tolin of Grants Pass, sister-in-law and sisters of H. L. MacKenzie.

"Before leaving New York I called on Mrs. Lora Streeter and Mr. and Mrs. Olaf Johnson, formerly of Hillsboro.

"Returning to Detroit, I visited my cousins, Miss Myrtle Walsh and Mr. and Mrs. Lyle Middleton, who had Ford plant and watched them make the plant is closed down temporarily for re-adjustment before resuming production of new cars.
