Mr. and Mrs. C. J. Crittenden visited Mr. and Mrs. Harry White of McMinnville Saturday night.

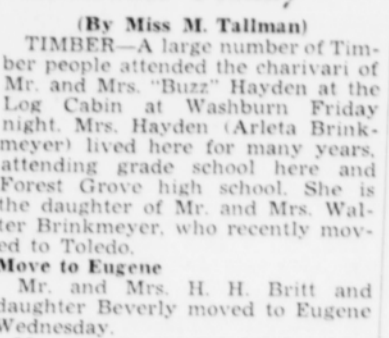

Traveling in their 135-horsepower Cadillac and "Roadhome," Mr. and Mrs. Charles B. Preston of Hillsboro have just returned from an extended outing in the lake region of Eastern Oregon. The roadhome is a recent design in trailers and is equipped for four persons, having two full size beds, a refrigerator holding 50 pounds of ice, a gasoline range, a sink and kitchenette, clothes closet, matrices, radio and air conditioning apparatus.

The outfit is electrified and when en route and no electric juice available, a gasoline motor, stored in the trunk rack of the trailer is connected and generates the electricity.

It is 21 feet in length and is fully equipped as a modern apartment suite. The next trip planned by the Prestons is a tour of the east and southeast. The roadhome was especially designed by Mrs. Preston and built to order in Los Angeles.

to pass safely at any point, and several sharp curves were being eliminated.

The county will continue the work with county machinery, grading out the remaining curves, and making necessary fills. The work will require additional rock surface in several spots.

This road was opened to regular traffic in 1935 under the work-relief setup, and surfaced by the county. However, about half of the right-of-way, already surfaced, was not touched by the crews. The road is steep, but passable to automobiles at all times, cutting off considerable distance for travelers from either side of the mountain by eliminating a trip through Newberg, or Hillsboro and Forest Grove, to reach Gaston.
