Hopeful of winning the trip to the Pacific International Livestock exposition this fall sponsored by the First National bank of Portland, 4-H club members in Washington county are competing special projects and preparing entries for county and 4-H fair competition.

Success of the 1936 contest arranged by the First National bank through its own branch units and county agents brought widening of the affair's scope to include all of Oregon this year, according to Walter H. Brown, assistant vice president of the bank in charge of the Pacific International visit. H. C. Seymour, Oregon 4-H club director, has again been appointed general chairman of the judging and awards.

The three-day visit in Portland October livestock exposition will include daily trips to the show grounds and entertainment by the host bank, which will pay transportation and all other expenses of the 4-H club members.
