### Voters Sanction School Repairs

New school building to cost \$100,000, and \$3,000 to repair and reconstruction of the high school heating plant, were authorized in two of three elections scheduled in Forest Grove.

The school building, which is to replace the Lincoln grade school, was authorized last week, according to a count of the ballots Saturday.

Monday a handful of voters authorized the union high school board to issue \$9000 in warrants for the rebuilding of the school heating plant.

Tuesday city voters will settle the question of a charter amendment permitting the city to cancel existing sanitary sewer loans with rental charges as the alternative to a bond issue.

### Fight Against Utility Contract Continued

Yamhill Electric company in which an extension of the old 25-year franchise is asked for a three-year period. The agreement includes a clause whereby the agreement can be terminated in 90 days by either party.

A. L. Strickland, manager of the Yamhill Electric, in outlining his stand in Newberg said this week:

"The suggestion which I offered was definitely that they extend the terms and conditions of the expired franchise for a limited period during which we would be willing to agree that a 60 or 90-day termination clause be effective."

"The city officials here thoroughly understand that my suggestion was that the old franchise, which had been in effect during the past 25 years, be extended in its original form for a period not to exceed three years."

Sherwood Resists. Sherwood resisted the form of a 20-year franchise presented there by Strickland, according to J. E. Morback, mayor, with the result that the company gave several concessions, including a more favorable rate for operation of the city water pumps.

Also, Morback said, a proposal made by the council for a slice of the gross revenue in the form of a tax for the privilege of operation in the streets of Sherwood, resulted in a compromise in which the city takes one-half of one percent of the gross revenue of the company.

This agreement was reached, the mayor said, after the company had declared that any higher rate could not be met because of the small size of the community.

Another concession was the insertion in the franchise of the 90-day termination clause, allowing either party to withdraw from the contract by serving proper notice, Mayor Morback said.

### Poultry Experts Cull Wednesday

In addition to culling older birds, Erickson's flock of year-old hens will be culled.

Culling is one of the most important management practices on a

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poultry farm, states Francis, and one which, unfortunately, has been neglected by too many of our poultrymen. Very reliable methods have been developed whereby the poor producers in the flock can be eliminated, and it is important that a poultryman avail himself of this information in order to eliminate the "star borders" from his flock.

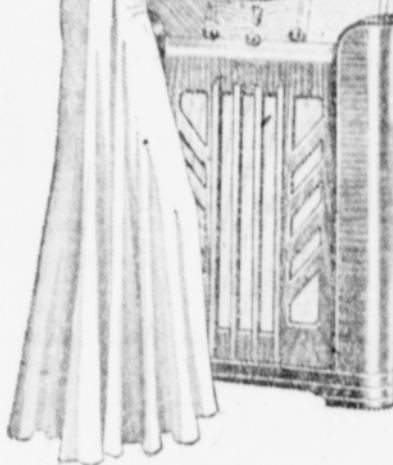

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### Annual Irrigation Tour August 20

(Continued from page 1) east of Hillsboro on Hillsboro-Schools road.

On the Warrens farm potatoes, a new seeding of ladino clover, and a new seeding of Superior Reed canary grass are receiving water. They are irrigated with the flood method, both in strip border and in rills, with the water being pumped partly by electric power, partly by gasoline tractor power. On the Reeves farm ladino clover is being irrigated with the sprinkler system.

The Fir Grove Dairy is using the water on a ladino clover and grass mixture for a dairy cattle pasture, part of which has been seeded four years. A new system was put in this year on the Hans Thurhner place on which water is being pumped with electric power. The pumping heads on these places vary widely and the result in costs are interesting to anyone contemplating any sort of irrigation system.

Another fire late the same day, destroyed the Carl J. Christensen residence, a mile east of Hillsboro. The fire was believed to have caught from a spark on the dry roof. Loss was covered by insurance.
