

### Girls' 4-H Club Work Closing Season With State, County Fair Competition

With the opening of the county fair today (Thursday) girls' 4-H clubs of the county enter the final phase of the year's activity. With the opening of school and the arrival of autumn, organization work will be underway for the new season.

Clubs, under the direction of O. B. Kraus, county school superintendent, and his assistant, Mrs. Zola Morgan, carry on a great deal of their activity through the various schools of the county, where teachers serve as leaders. Otherwise women of the various communities, interested in the activities, take charge of the work.

#### Clubs Decrease

This year there were 66 clubs, or six less than for the season 1935-36. Decrease was in sewing units, with 35 this year as compared to 43 a year ago. Besides the sewing clubs this year, there are 27 crocheting clubs, two canning clubs, one-room improvement, and one-hobby club.

At the state fair a year ago, three places in the competition went to girls from this county. Jean Ann Connell won second with a "Dollar Dinner," Eleanor Bendler, was third in homemaking, and Lois Mays, fourth for "drop cookies."

Summer school was more popular than ever this year with an attendance of 44 from the girls' clubs, many attending on scholarships awarded by individuals, organizations and communities.

Winners in last year's exhibits and demonstrations found prizes well scattered among the various clubs of the county.

In canning, division I, Juanita Heynderickx, Eunice Sahnow, Vernice Sahnow and Emily Kerkman, Schefflin club, won first, second, third and fifth, and Juanita Cawrse of Academy won fourth. Rhea Jewell Bilyeu of Durham was first in division II.

Shirley Carlson of Mountainside was first in camp cookery with Don Eagon of Hillsboro, second. In division I of cooking, "drop cookie" winners were Lois Mays of North Plains, first, and Elizabeth Teschner, Laura Haberly, Lois Bunn and Myra MacGregor of Aloha-Huber taking the other four places.

Dick Chamberlain of North Plains took first in "ice box cookies," Billy Troutman and Scotty Stigum of the same club won third and fourth. Betty Richards of Aloha-Huber and Ruth Guerber of Helvetia won fifth.

Two girls from Academy, Kathryn and Juanita Cawrse, took first and second in "angel food cake," while Emily Kerkman of Schefflin was third.

Schefflin club won three of the five places in "sponge cake," with first going to Mildred Kahle and fourth and fifth to Juanita Cawrse and Eunice Sahnow. Onita Hesterlee and Lois Kincheleoe won second and third for the Hazeldale club. Jean Ann Connell of Jackson, Rhea Bilyeu of Durham and Jacqueline Walters of Hillsboro were in first, second and third place in division III.

Hillsboro took two places, first and second, in bachelor sewing, represented by Billie Everett and Delmar Mohr, while Ora Gene Smith, Dale Downing and Bernard VanDomelen of Glenwood won the three remaining prizes.

In division II, sewing, Juanita Heynderickx and Florence Evers of Schefflin won first and second with the remaining places going to Doris Simmons of Blooming, Leonard Wendt and Grace Hudson of Lelsyville.

Winners in "Rest Unit," division II, were Patricia E. Anderson of Tigard, Bernice McKnight, Hazel and Helen Stream of Shute, Irene Whitmore of Whitmore district won first in "Work Unit," with second and third places going to Lois Robson and Bernice Ensley of Orenco, Lucile Chilson of Tigard and Evelyn Ann Busch of Hillsboro.

Jean Schilling of Aloha-Huber was first in division III with Rhea Bilyeu of Durham and Viola Westcott of Jacktown, winning the remaining prizes. Hazel Smith of Glenwood won division IV, and Kathryn Cawrse of Academy, division V.

Eleanor Bendler of Hillsboro won first in homemaking with Viola Westcott of Jacktown second. Durham club won first and second in Hobby club represented by Mary Jaques and Rhea Bilyeu.

Smut is still a big problem in the wheat growing sections of Oregon that approximately one-third of the wheat that reaches the market is docked more or less because of it. Because of prevalence of the disease, no new wheat is now released from the Moro or Pendleton branch experiment stations unless it shows marked resistance to all known forms of smut without being treated. The recently distributed Rex wheat is highly resistant to smut, but even it is not recommended for seeding without treatment. By treating it, growers may escape smut losses, however.
