Dancing Teacher Finds New Steps

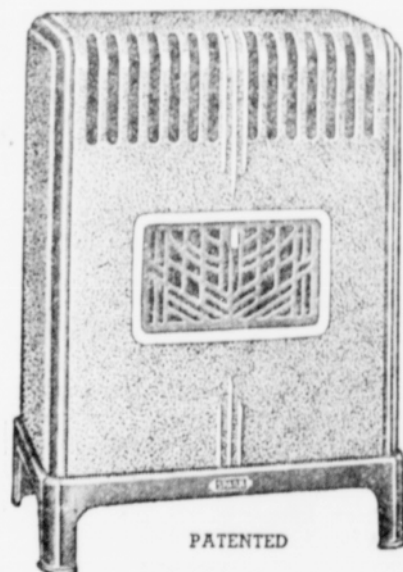

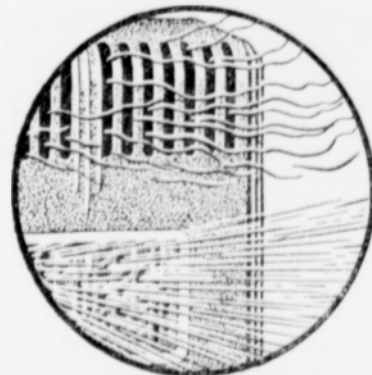
