

Crop, Livestock Judging Teams Selected in Annual Contests

Ed Setniker of the Hazeldale dairy club was the high point judge of the 4-H livestock judging contests, and Herbert Lafky and Ralph Gifford of the Tualatin corn club tied for high point in the crops judging contest, reports L. E. Francis, assistant county agent. These contests were held August 25 and 26.

Setniker made a score of 519 out of a possible 600 points and Lafky and Gifford made 424 out of a possible 500 points.

The livestock judging team from the Hazeldale dairy club, Charles Shaper, leader, placed first in the contest, with the Tualatin and Schefflin clubs tying for second. Members of the Hazeldale team, who will participate in the judging contest at the Oregon State fair, are Joe Berger, Ed Setniker and Wilfred Barnett.

Tualatin Winner

The Tualatin team, by virtue of having the highest scoring individual, will represent the county at the Pacific International. The members of this team are Wilbur and Willis Nyberg and Ralph Gifford.

Tualatin corn club crops judging team placed first in the crops contest and will represent the county at the state fair. Ralph Gifford, Herbert Lafky and Wilbur Nyberg compose the membership of this team.

Kenneth Jaquith, Peronice Ego, and George Allison Jr. are the members of the Chealem Mountain potato club judging team, which placed second in the crops contest, and will participate in the Judging activities at the Pacific International.

Hazeldale Boy Second

Second high individual honors in the livestock judging contest went to Joe Berger of the Hazeldale dairy

club, Wilbur Nyberg of the Tualatin dairy club and Norman Bradley of the Orenco-Shute dairy club. Each made a score of 465 points. Bob Heinrich, Schefflin dairy club, won third honors with 450 points, and Donald Meier of the Rock Creek dairy club fourth with a score of 435. In the crops judging contest, Wilbur Nyberg held second honors with a score of 419, and Willis Nyberg third honors with a score of 411.

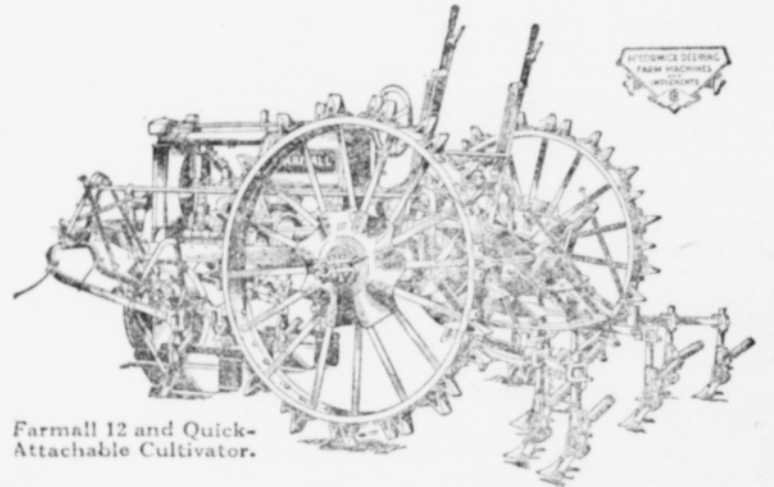

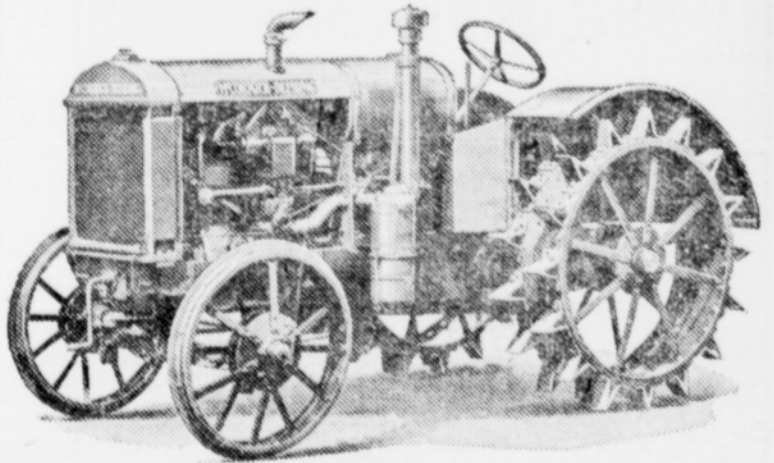
