Mr. and Mrs. Bailey of California are visiting Mrs. Bailey's mother, Mrs. Dan Roe.

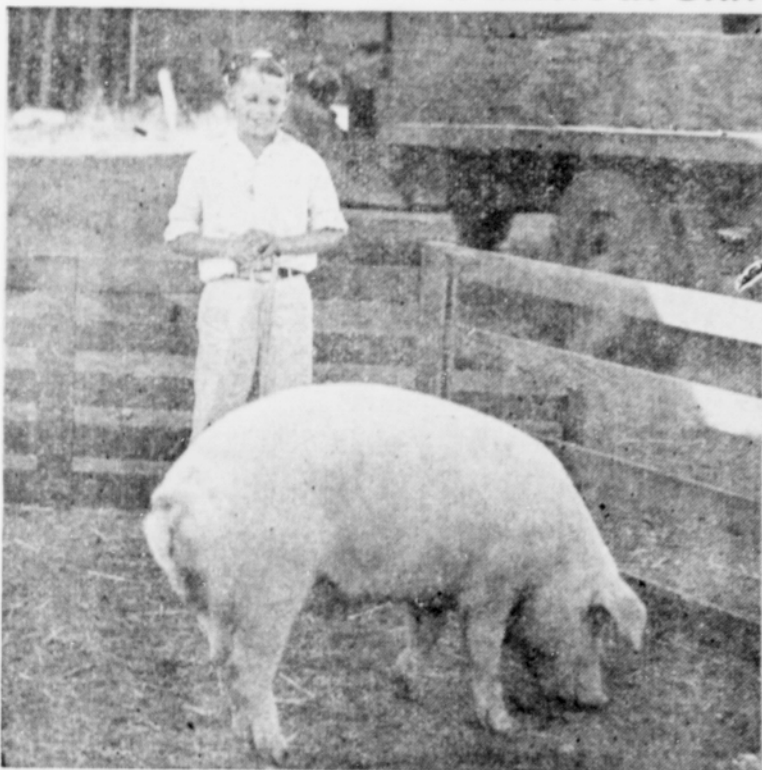
Howard Hollenbeck left Sunday to spend the week traveling with his uncle, H. W. Gunther, of Redmond through Eastern Oregon.
