

Pioneer Pageant Presented at Fair

Presenting tableaux scenes of early history, the successful Junior Pioneer pageant of last year was repeated Thursday night at the county fair as a feature of the three-day event. The pageant was sponsored by the Hillsboro Coffee club and directed by Mrs. H. H. Stannard.

Tableaux included an Indian village, Joe Meek, pioneer settler of the county, and his wife and child; the first school, massacre of Marcus Whitman, pioneer ship, "Star of Oregon," first postoffice and David Hill, for whom Hillsboro was named; "Among My Souvenirs," and vaudeville in the Crescent theatre, early day playhouse in Hillsboro.

The pageant opened with a song by Mrs. V. W. Gardner, accompanied by the piano by Mrs. F. J. Sewell. She sang "Waters of Minnetonka," to introduce the Indian village and the scenes to follow.

Joseph Meek, as brought out in the reading by Mrs. Stannard, drove the first wagon to Walla Walla valley in 1840, opening the way to a permanent wagon road. He was accompanied by his wife and child.

The first school was conducted by Tabitha Brown, who came to Wilamette valley on horseback when she was 65 years old. Her school was attended by seven children.

News of the massacre of Marcus Whitman in December, 1847, reached the little colony in Washington county as soon afterwards as limited travel could bring the news, thus adding to the events of those early days.

Proceeding the presentation of the "Star of Oregon," Miss Ruth Boyles of Forest Grove, played two numbers on her violin, accompanied at the piano by Miss Wagner. This presentation brought Pacific university into the pageant, the university being a pioneer institution, and both young women having been students of that institution recently.

Center of interest, of course, in the pioneer colony, was the post-office where letters were received at intervals, after long travel, from relatives and friends in the east. David Hill was the first postmaster.

Introducing the history of the Forest Grove fire department, and the family album, Mrs. Gardner sang "Among My Souvenirs." The family album presented a number of character poses suggestive of family groups of years ago, and including the old maid aunts, the college twins; the spinners; bride and bridegroom, the sister-in-law, and the dancer. The dancer, posed in the picture, came to life. Among the pictures was Judge R. Frank Peters.

The pageant closed with a singing comedy act such as vaudeville shows of years ago presented.

Committee chairmen and groups in charge of the various tableaux included Mrs. S. A. D. Meek, Cornelius, route 1; Mrs. Pearl Vandomelen, Mountindale; Hillsboro Grange; Mrs. Tom Bronleewe, Mrs. E. Prickett, and Mrs. Otis Smith, Forest Grove; Mrs. Orville Compton, and Mrs. H. H. Stannard, Hillsboro; Mrs. Stannard was the reader.
