

Hilhi Football Squad Lighter; Practice Starts

Blue and White aspirants to football fame reported for the first full practice on the high school field Tuesday afternoon and were subjected to a good workout under the direction of Coach B. M. Goodman and his assistant, Reece Hathorn.

Shorn of weight by graduations last spring, Hilhi will enter the season with a lighter line and plenty of inexperienced material.

Among the mainstays of last year's strong team, who are out of uniform this year, are Elman Schumacher, tackle; Tom Goodin, and U. Stout, guards; Moore and Howe, ends; Phelps and Pechlin, O's; the swift moving backfield of last year are Walter, Dave Crittenden, LeRoy Jack and Sigler.

Backs with some experience with the regulars last year are Wes Ketcham, Ray Laur, Ed Grogan, Fred Baumgardner and Harold Wolahn.

Linemen who are promising material from the B squad of a year ago, are Jack Christensen, Robert Spiering, Francis Brown, Bill Corvan, Ray Estinger, Kenneth George, Bill Means, Glenn Sandford and Harry Wolahn.

A number of home games will be played under the lights installed on the Hilhi field last summer.

EUGENE—Oregon's high school stars will fill most of the important roles in the University of Oregon's varsity football campaign this fall with home stations dominating the 1937 Westfoot squad more strongly than ever before.

Led by eight former Portland prep stars, the Oregon contingent numbers 27 of the top-ranking 40 squad members.

D. Tucker, resident of Reedville 14 years, for authority to take over George's Truck Service permit and continue operations under the same name. The service has been operated by Otto George since 1922, serving the area from Reedville to Portland, and intermediate points of Jacksonville, Beaverton, Farmington and Hazeldeale. Tucker is asking for authority to expand and to operate for hire anywhere within 25 miles of Reedville and to and from any point in Oregon from within that radius. Witnesses testified that shortage of truck service in their communities exists to such an extent that at some seasons farmers do their hauling by wagon. Witnesses were H. J. Schlottman of Huber and R. C. Schappert of Reedville. Prink Callison, University of Oregon football coach, has one of the highest all-time coaching records among the nation's leading mentors.
