Mrs. C. A. Morgan was ill at her home here last week.

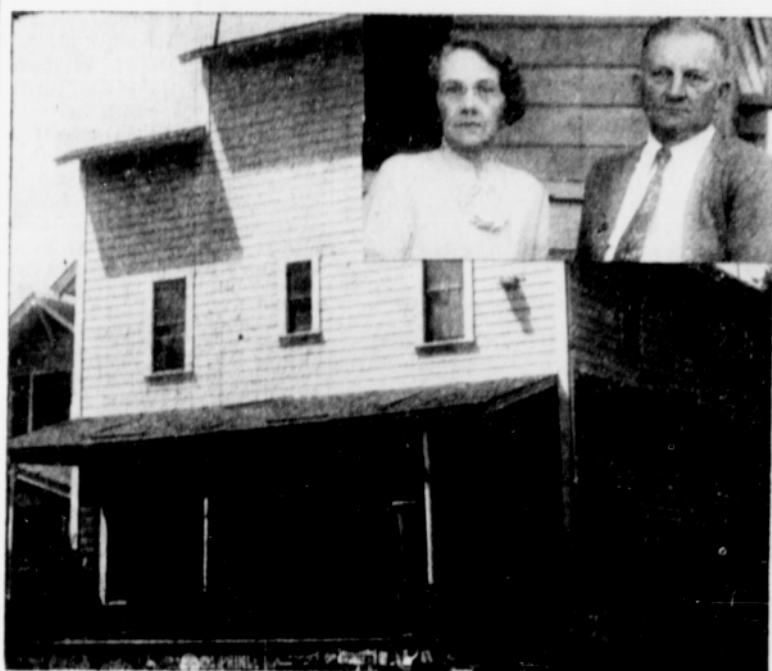
Regular business meeting of the Woman's Benefit Association. Review was postponed from September 8 to September 15.

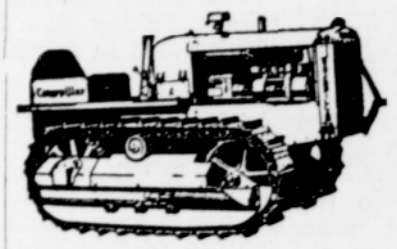
