Mrs. Kincaid was born at Dry Run, Iowa, January 1, 1859. She married Will Kincaid, October 30, 1883, and a few years later came to Oregon. The couple lived in Washington for two years, then returned to Oregon and settled near Corbett, where they spent the rest of their lives. Mrs. Kincaid died in 1901. Surviving are a daughter, Mrs. Hulit, and son, Ralph, of Corbett; grandchildren, Fay, Dwight and Curtis Hulit and Mrs. Walter Schmidt of near Hillsboro, and four great grandchildren; a sister, Mrs. Maggie McFarland, and brother, Joe Conk, of Pryor, Okla. Funeral was held Wednesday at the Corbett Christian church, with interment in the Corbett pioneer cemetery.

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government consent, the city used \$2046 of sewer construction funds to pay the first half year interest. On the other hand engineering expense charged to the construction fund, was disallowed by the government, and the city was compelled to charge \$1532.40 from the sewer revenue into the construction fund. This amount had been paid for salaries and other engineering expense.

Commenting on the auditor's finding, E. A. Griffith, chairman of the finance committee, declared that it is the earnest desire of the council to keep within the budget and hold expenses to a minimum. "We now are getting monthly reports of finances from the auditor and city manager so that the committee will be kept up to date on meeting exactly how the city stands," Griffith said.

(Continued from page 1) the city has collected \$33,505.91 over a long period for the retirement of improvement bonds, which was not included in the issuance of the refunding bonds. Apparently, the refunding bonds, this money was used for other city purposes, through other funds, when the issuance of the refunding bonds should have been reduced by that amount. This sum, the report shows, has been accumulating from budgeted collections over a considerable period of time.
