Fire Call Puzzles Hillsboro Firemen

Fire, about 2:30 p. m. Saturday, burned a portion of the roof on the old Curry house at the south foot of Seventh street. Further damage was prevented by the arrival of the country pumper.

Failure to report the fire as on South Seventh resulted in considerable confusion among the firemen, but the problem was solved when part of the apparatus went north and the remainder south on Seventh, firemen said. Cause of the fire is believed to have been an overheated chimney.

Firemen attempting to find the fire, again declared that persons calling the department would save many minutes, and possible large losses, by taking sufficient time to give specific locations.

Burning Permits Will be Required

SALAM—Permits for the burning of brush in land clearing operations as well as for the reduction of slash hazards within the forest areas of the state will still be required after October 1, according to a statement issued today by State Forester J. W. Ferguson. The old law which officially ended the closed season for burning on October 31 of each year was amended at the last session of the legislature, according to the forester, and now is extended until December 31, unless ended prior to that time through a proclamation by the governor.

"While there has been considerable rain throughout the state and the hazard is materially reduced," stated Mr. Ferguson, "indications at the present are that it is of a

temporary nature and a few days of low humidities would put the organization face to face with a serious fire problem. The regular personnel will be kept in the field and those who desire burning permits will have no difficulty in getting in touch with wardens. Just as soon as conditions indicate the definite end of the fire season, the restrictions on burning will be lifted."

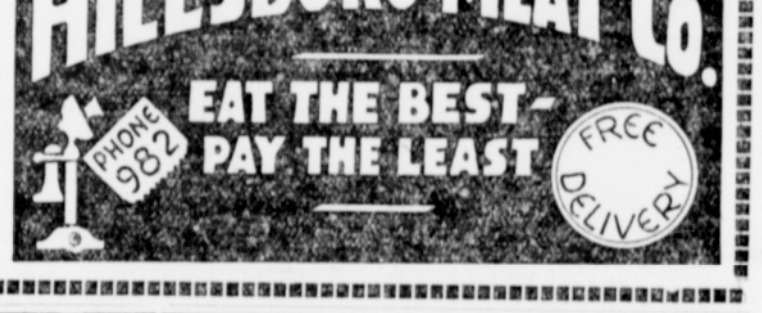
