

Albany Beats Scrappy Hilhi Eleven 14-0

Unable to cope with Albany's razzle-dazzle passing attack, a scrappy Hilhi eleven lost to the Blue and White 14 to 0 here Friday night. However, the locals displayed a vastly improved running and aerial offense and were able to bottle up Albany's powerful line smashes during most of the game.

A fumble punt recovered by Albany on the Blue and White 17-yard line put Hilhi in the hole at the start of the tilt. Immediately the locals dug in to smear the first play for a two-yard loss. A long pass fell incomplete. Shrock, Albany half, was dumped and was good behind the line of scrimmage, and then a fourth down pass was rushed and thrown wild. Hilhi took the ball on down, ran three line plays and kicked out of danger.

Drive 51 Yards
Albany uncorked the first sustained drive of the game early in the second quarter, marching 51 yards for a score. Razzle-dazzle passes and line smashes by Drago, a tackle shifted to fullback for the drive, featured the attack.

A lateral off the forward pass caught Hilhi napping and was good for 25 yards. Two line plays failed to gain and then a shovel pass over the middle of the forward wall connected for nine more. Drago took up the attack, smashing the Hilhi 3-yard line and a first down. Drago hit center for two more. Albany's quarterback, Vierieck, hit pay dirt on the next play, reversing over the left side of the line to score standing up. The conversion kick was good.

Offensive Flash
Hilhi came back with its first offensive flash of the season. Grogan, running behind beautiful interference by Lawrence and Baumgartner, took the kickoff on his own three-yard stripe and raced upfield 43 yards. Ketcham lost five yards on an attempted line buck, but Grogan gained it back and more, rifling a long pass to Sutherland for a 24-yard gain. The three broke up on the Albany 35-yard line as four long passes went incomplete.

Albany gained its final tally at the start of the third period. Lawrence fumbled a shovel pass and Albany recovered to set the stage for the 60-yard march. Gilerist, substitute Albany back, started the fireworks, grabbing a long pass for a 30-yard gain. Hilhi's Drago picked up 13 yards in three tries. Vierieck made four, and B. Fiske took a pass for a first down on the two-yard marker. Drago bucked center for the score and B. Fiske took a pass for the conversion.

Late in the fourth quarter Hilhi launched a 43-yard drive that bogged down deep in Albany territory. Taking the ball on the Hilhi 38, the Blue and White connected with a forward and lateral good for 10 yards. Two passes went wild and then Sutherland sneaked Grogan's long pass for a first down on the Albany 30. Another pass, Grogan to "Speed" Lawrence, was completed for a first down on the 20. A shovel pass and lateral gained three more, but the attack stopped at this point, three goal line passes going incomplete.

Coach Matthews of Portland university discussed football and told interesting football stories at the Rotary club luncheon Thursday. W. C. Christensen was chairman.

Much credit for the development of football was given the veteran coach, "Pop" Warner, of Carlisle Indian and Stanford university fame. Matthews said most football systems in use today were developments of either of the two basic systems, Warner or Notre Dame.
