Buchanan Herd First Among Large Herds in the County

The C. B. Buchanan Jr. herd of 45 cows, purebred and grade Jerseys, near Gaston, was high for herds over 20 cows in the Washington County Herd Improvement association in August testing. Average pounds of milk in the Buchanan herd was 700 and butterfat percentage was 37.95.
Mrs. Tom Williams' purebred Jersey herd of 19 cows had the high producing herd for the month and was high in the 12-20 cow herd division with a milk average of 813 and a butterfat average of 37.95. L. R. Allen with a herd of 11 grade Jerseys led for herds under 12 cows. Milk average was 768 pounds and butterfat was 37.95.
C. E. Robertson and son had the high producing cow for the month, Rose Ann, a Jersey which produced 1466 pounds of milk containing 88.0 pounds of fat.
L. R. Allen had the second high producing cow for the month, Blackie No. 2, which produced 1646 pounds of milk containing 79.0 pounds of fat.
