The parent stock was imported from Japan, some individuals attaining the enormous length of 12 inches. The shells are used, when ground, for poultry feed, street paving where these shells abound and for ornaments.

To keep the adult oysters within bounds, fences made of 36-inch stakes placed 2 inches apart are driven in the ground. To harvest, remove the big oysters collected against this fence, pick out their smaller progeny, carry in baskets to a scow which is towed by a tug to the cannery. The native oysters have long ago been removed from this region by oyster fishermen, many of whom have grown fairly rich at the business.

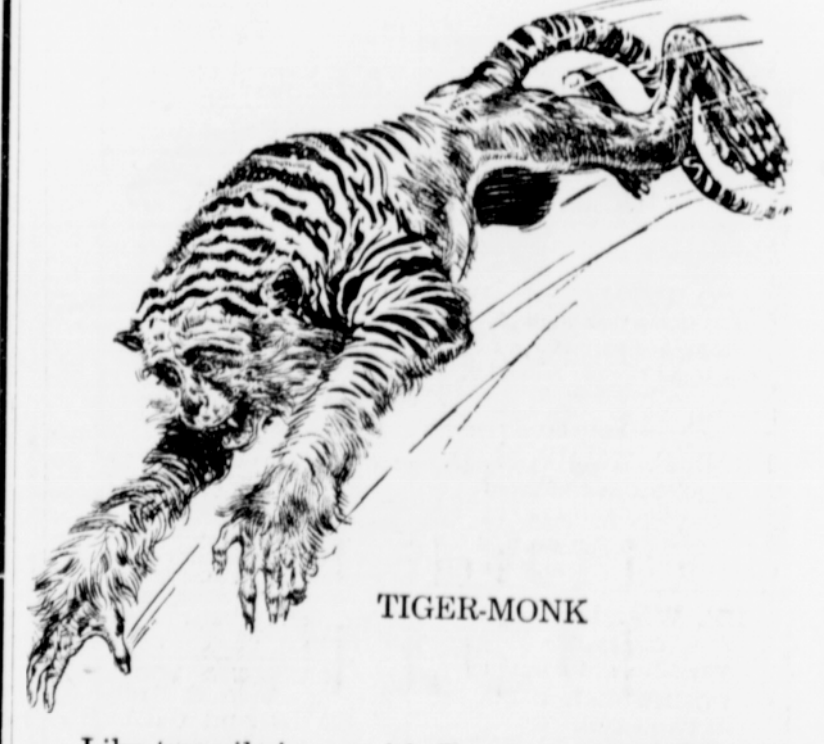


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
