Father Carberry drew many of his examples from the life of the late Knute Rockne, coach of Notre Dame university, with whom he was personally acquainted. The Carberry family has been well known in football circles, one brother having been a captain of the Notre Dame team, and another brother having played on the eleven of the same university during another season. The present coach of St. Mary's played halfback under Elmer Layden, present Notre Dame mentor.

Convocation ended with the ceremonies of Paradise chapter, and the official transferring of

three names from the active roll to the roll of that chapter, whose bearers passed away since the last convocation. Names transferred were those of M. Kathleen Greig, LeRoy Jack and Shirley A. Kelley. Elwood Colet was soloist during the ritual, and one of the hymns used was an "Ave Maria" to an original setting, sung for the first time last evening, and to be used henceforth in the clubs' ritual for Paradise chapter, dedicated to Shirley Kelley.
