Many friends in this community attended the funeral of Mrs. O. B. Bennett Saturday morning. She is survived by her husband and three grown children.

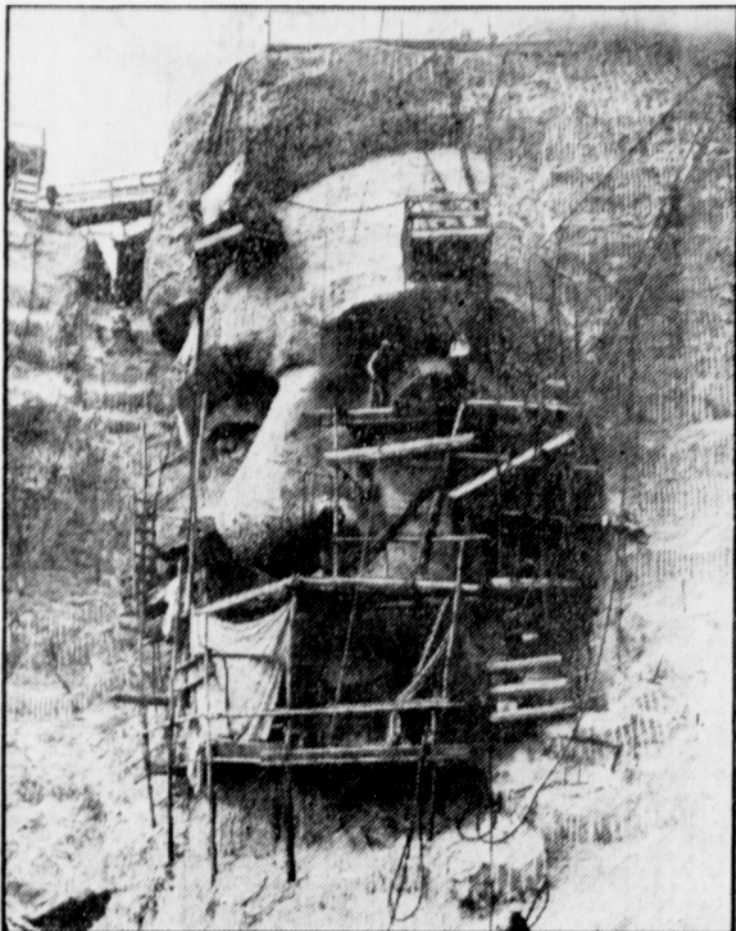
Rev. Theo Leger retired pastor of the German Bethany Baptist church is now living at the German Baptist Old Folks' Home in Portland.

This close-up view of workmen under Sculptor Gutzon Borglum carving the head of Abraham Lincoln on the sharp granite face of Mount Rushmore, near Rapid City, S. Next to it will be carved a head of Theodore Roosevelt. The figures of Thomas Jefferson and George Washington already have been completed on the same level.

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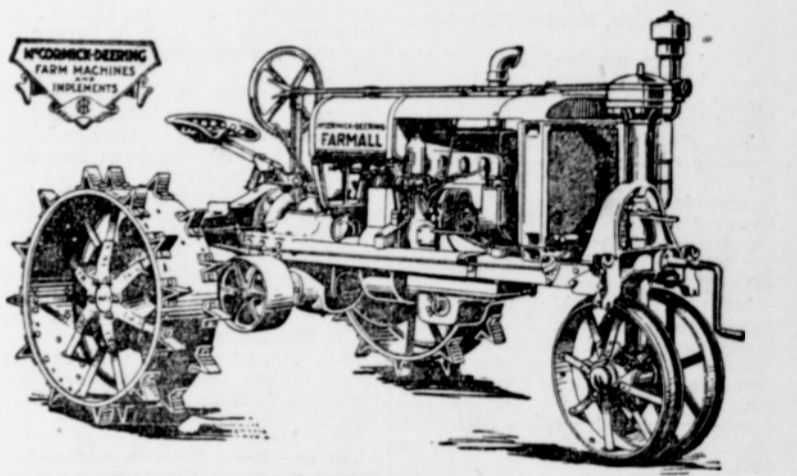
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
