### Experiences in China Cited by Relative

HAZELDALE—Parts of a letter received last Friday by Mrs. John Imlah, from her brother, John Blalock, dated August 27 at Tsingtao, Shantung, China, are as follows:

"We have certainly had lots of experience since arriving here in China, I mess you know there is

China. I guess you know there is a war over here. That is why I am down here at Tsingtao on the coast. We were ordered to evacuate by our consul. There are several American naval vessels here to protect us but as yet we haven't seen or even heard any fighting. We are all

"Today a bunch of Shanghai papers got through to us, after a week's delay. I see in them about all kinds of trouble in Tsingtao. We are in Tsingtao and there has been no real trouble so far, except a lot of tension and evacuation of Ja-panese and Chinese, so you cannot always tell by what you read in the papers.

"No one here knows what is go-ing to happen, and I cannot tell what I'm going to do. We haven't received any foreign mail since ar-

"This letter may take a long time reaching you if it ever does, for now the mail has to go from here by train, and bus all the way south to Hong Kong before going on ship for America. This is on account of the fighting in Shanghai. "We had a very nice time this

summer. During the hot season we moved up on the side of Tai Shan. the great sacred mountain near Tain, where is was nice and cool, and we could study in the mornings and in the afternoon go hiking. We also had a tennis court up there and a fine swimming pool, so we had lots of fun. A number of other missionaries had come from a distance and were living near us. On the fourth of July we Americans had a big basket dinner at the Randall's place. There was lots of shooting of fire crackers, games and tennis, and

a swim in the afternoon.
"Several times during the summer we would get together and go on hikes to some of the beautiful spots in the mountains around there and have a picnic. There were many beautiful places, springs, old temples, waterfalls and mountain

peculiar in the summer time, for that is not only the hot season of the year, but the rainy season. It would rain for days this summer Club Meets October 15 would rain for days this summer without stopping, and the fog would come right into the houses. Everything would get wet. The matches wouldn't light, clothes and suit cases, especially leather things would all mold, When the first sumy day came we would have to put things in the sun to dry, "Most of the missionaries try to get away to the mountains every summer during the hot weather, because it is dangerous to not go. Besides the dangers from malaria and cholera there are all kinds of other diseases. That is why we must boil everything that we cat and drink over here."
