

# Aloha Host to County Council on Tuesday

"To Know is to Grow" was the theme of the annual "school of instruction" conducted by the state officers Tuesday at the fall meeting of the Washington County Council of Parents and Teachers in the Aloha Community church.

Mrs. Fred Smith, Portland, state vice-president from this district, presided at the school which brings to organized units and the public an intimate knowledge of the program that is being carried on in child welfare under the guidance of the national congress and enlightens their interest and help in this program.

Mrs. F. W. Blum, Portland, brought greetings to the officers of local associations and explained their duties and answered questions on parliamentary procedure. Mrs. Bert V. Chappell, Portland, described the work of membership and hospitality committees and explained publications available in many fields of interest.

Mrs. Martin W. Jones, state press chairman, told of the McLoughlin bust project and urged the cooperation of all units in building this shrine dedicated to Oregon's greatest historical character. In explaining publicity work in the units, Mrs. Jones said, "a friendly attitude and smile is one of the best forms of publicity." She further stated, "remember the editor of your paper is doing you a favor in co-operating with you." She explained that publicity creates pride in members, increases membership and encourages outsiders.

Dr. D. C. McDonald, county physician, and Miss Agnes Engbretsen, nurse, spoke of the county health program and the state survey to discover handicapped children and provide educational opportunities for them.
