Corinne Antrim, Aloha, has received her junior certificate at the

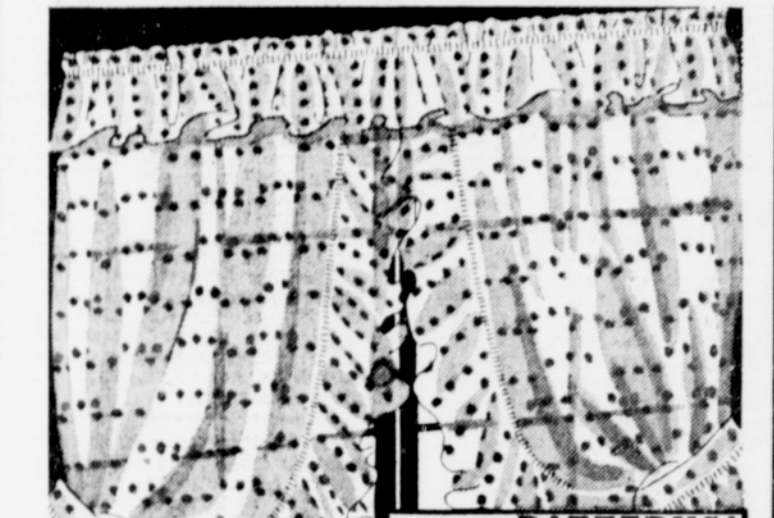
University of Oregon with honors privilege, according to an announcement by the registrar's office.

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
