boyhood home community and his father was a pioneer leader in the church.

A noon luncheon is scheduled for the grange hall with Miss Dulcinea Brown, religious educational director of the Portland council of churches, and a former member of the Hillsboro church, as toastmistress.

Assisting the pastor, Rev. R. L. Putnam, are John West, Jr., Elbert Bentley, Mildred James, Mrs. Elwood Johnson and L. B. Hall. Mrs. Florence Kramien was in charge of musical arrangements. Robert Kelly will lead in community singing of gospel songs preceding the program.

Oldest members of the church are Mrs. Amanda Perkins, since 1890, and Mrs. Bessie James, Mrs. E. C. Brown, and Mrs. Bell Millsprague, since 1894.

According to oldest records available the church was organized October 17, 1862 by Elders J. E. Murphy with 16 charter members. Mary E. Moore was the last member of the group to die. Members now living with the longest membership record are Mrs. Amanda Perkins since 1890 and Mrs. Bessie James, Mrs. C. E. Brown, Mrs. Bell Millsprague since 1894. The first minister on record, as a local pastor, was Calvin Adams in 1871. Pioneer itinerant preachers or local elders did the preaching in those early days. Pioneer preachers who have filled the local pulpit full-time or occasionally were H. M. Waller, Bales, George Richardson, James Campbell, Neal Cheatham, Peter Burnett, W. W. Watson, A. B. Wade, H. Watkins, R. L. Shelley and K. H. Sickafosse.

The first house of worship was erected in 1887 at a cost of \$12,000. It was open to the use of other communions that had no place of worship. That building is now the apartment dwelling of Mrs. Amanda Perkins on Third avenue, adjoining the present church property. Exact date as to when the present structure was erected is not known, but it was remodeled and a basement put under it in 1912 or 1913, during the pastorate of Albyn Eason, deceased, at a cost of \$2,767.61, and again, during the ministry of Melvin Putnam, deceased. As the structure now stands it was dedicated November 29, 1929, at a cost of \$8,500, including new furnishings.

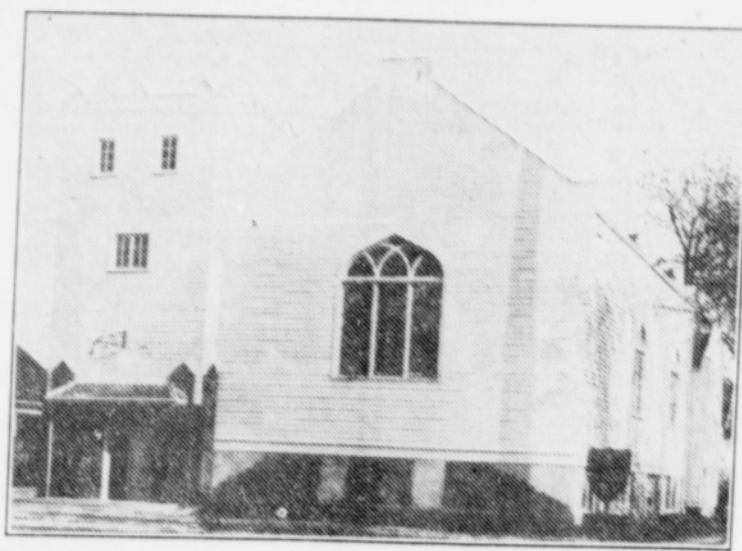
