

McMinnville High School Eleven Invades Hillsboro Field on Friday Night

Hilhi Club Goes Through Heavy Practice Round

A green Hillsboro high school football team will attempt to crash the victory column Friday night on the Hilhi field, meeting the invading McMinnville eleven at 8 o'clock.

Victims of two defeats and a tie in their first three games of the season, the Hilhi gridders stand to lose this game—on paper. Past battles between the two clubs, however, indicate that they should put up a hard scrap and may pull the game out of the fire.

A change in offensive strategy this week, following the 12-7 Beaverton debacle, was promised by B. M. Goodman, Hillsboro coach.

Defensive needs were not overlooked, and the local preparers will have their hands full trying to stop the smashing of Kreider and Sittler, Bear's hard-playing backs.

Bear's Team Strong

That McMinnville has another strong team this year, despite the graduation of Don Mabee, was indicated by Eugene Axemen, and a 14-0 win over Forest Grove. The latter game will offer a chance for direct comparison, inasmuch as Forest Grove and Hillsboro battled to a scoreless deadlock in the first game of the season.

The return to full strength of Bob Sutherland, hefty end, should bolster the forwards. In the Beaverton game, the ends and tackles suffered a series of onslaughts during the entire game, and Sutherland's leg injury had its effect.

County Quintets Open Training for Loop Season

The Washington County Basketball league, which was headed by Dr. A. M. Abrams of Hillsboro last year is resuming activities for the coming season.

When a satisfactory number of teams have signified their intentions of playing again this season the first meeting will be called to draw up rules and regulations and a tentative schedule.

A new member was added over last year's list when Coach Robinson, formerly of St. Mary's, entered the Huber aggregation which lists several former St. Mary's boys.

Hillsboro team will be intact over last year with several new additions who promise to round out a much better team than last season, when it won the trophy.

"The only trouble the local team will encounter is a suitable playing court. It was hampered last year with very little practice and when games were played it had to wait for the high school contests to be completed.

The Hillsboro quintet will begin practice within a short time. Wahner, Shattuck, McCoy, Ingraham, Sutherland, Peterson are returning, with two new possibilities in McDonald and Hendricks.
