This ranking was achieved by only 115 students, some of whom were good enough to get exemptions from the first freshman English course.

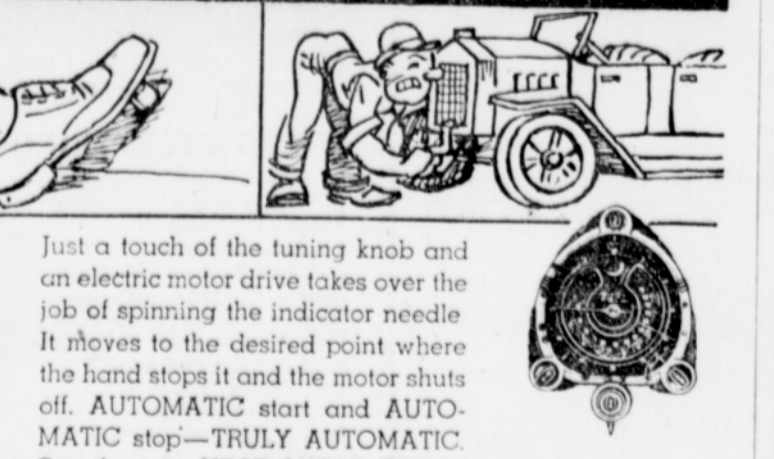
