water-generated power, power from sawdust-fired boilers and power from oil-burning boilers. Mr. Easter pointed out, "Should one power supply fail, the other two types move into the breach."
The new boiler in Station L has a capacity of 225,000 pounds of steam per hour, and is completely automatic in its operation. It is particularly adapted for "boosting" during peak hours, reaching its maximum capacity quickly. The new boiler increases the steam output capacity of Station L by approximately 20 per cent.
"The recent shutdowns in Portland lumber mills have jeopardized a steady supply of sawdust and hog fuel, and the installation of the new boiler, using oil exclusively, minimizes the danger from fuel shortage. Other boilers at the plant are adapted for both sawdust and oil, and some use sawdust exclusively."
Tuberculin Tests Given
