

### Plymouth and Dodge Display Cady's Today

Hillsboro will be given its first glimpse of the 1938 model Dodge and Plymouth today when the two lines are formally presented to the public at the Cady Motor company. Two grades—satisfactory or unsatisfactory—work means that the child is performing up to his or her capacity. "Unsatisfactory" means that he is not using his talents.

In other words, a child with an ability to get near-perfect results is doing unsatisfactory work if he fails to achieve his expectancy. Similarly, if he has talents for only mediocre results, and achieves his limits, his work is satisfactory.

**Citizenship Important**  
The proponents of the plan, however, believe that the crux of the new method rests in the portion given over to citizenship traits. It is here, they contend, that parents will get the best insight into Johnny's Status at school—as a citizen and as a student.

"We have contended with many problems in the former method of grading," said Superintendent Poynter. "The old report card became an ideal in itself—children and parents saw only the grade without knowing the story behind it."

"With this new technique, we hope to enlist the aid of parents in studying the background of the child's grades, and this can best be

done if we know his capabilities and attitudes."

"Of course there will be opposition, but when the parents understand the new method and what it aims for they will realize its benefits."

### Highway Courtesy to Visitors Urged

Every Oregon motorist can perform a service of benefit to his state by a courteous attitude toward visiting motorists, declares Dr. E. B. McDaniel, president of the Oregon State Motor association, discussing the importance of such a spirit among resident motorists.

Good motoring manners as well as a proper regard for the business value of Oregon's immense and growing motor tourist travel trade requires an attitude of hospitable courtesy toward "the stranger within our gates," the motorist leader declared.

"While displays of discourtesy on the highway are always a thing to be avoided," he continued, "they are particularly deplorable when the display of bad motoring manners is directed toward a visiting motorist."

"Courtesy is an essential part of hospitality and the Oregon motorist who fails to heed that fact performs a distinct disservice to his state."

"A too rigid insistence as to right of way, unnecessary and irritable blasts of the horn, and other failures of courtesy are bad enough when another home motorist is involved."

"But when they are directed toward a motorist with out-of-state license plates on his car they very definitely jeopardize Oregon's reputation for hospitality. Visitors are particularly sensitive to the treatment they receive. They eagerly appreciate courtesy, but they also resent and bitterly remember the lack of it."

"Make the visiting motorist traveling in Oregon feel that he is a welcome and appreciated guest, entitled to every courtesy and consideration."

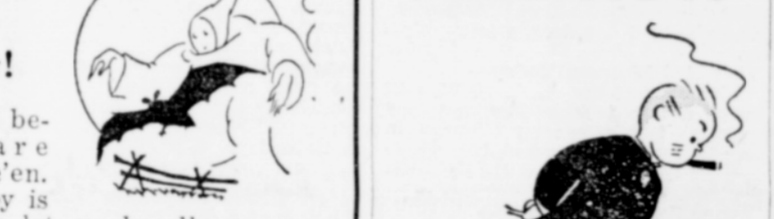

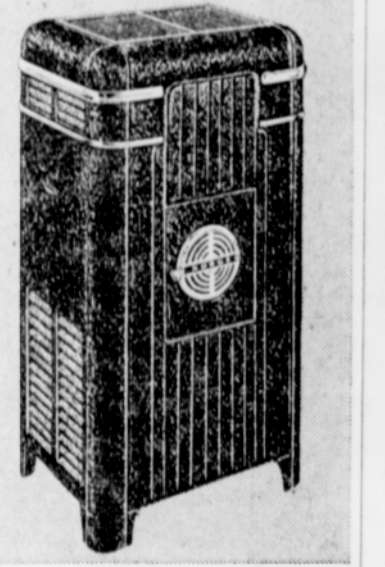
