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# Turkey Expert Here Tuesday

Noel L. Bennion, new extension poultryman of the Oregon State college, will discuss the subject "Selection and Care of Breeding Stock" at a meeting for Washington county turkey raisers, which will be held Tuesday, November 2, in the Hillsboro chamber of commerce rooms at 8 p. m.

As the turkey marketing season approaches, the problem of selecting breeding stock becomes more and more important to the turkey raisers. Considerable progress has been made in recent years in the methods of selecting breeding stock from the market flock and Bennion has considerable information on this subject, which will be of interest and value to the turkey raisers.

Equal in importance to the proper selection of breeding stock is the proper care of the breeding birds from now until the breeding season next spring. Many breeding turkeys are given a poor start into the breeding season because of a lack of information on the part of the operator with regard to proper feeding and management.

The meeting will be open to all Washington county turkey raisers and any others who are interested in the turkey production problems.

county court and the budget committee felt that 1938 should bring with it a more far reaching road program which would permit the improvement of county roads which, through necessity, have been more or less neglected during the years of small and inadequate road budget.

Members of the budget committee, which met with the county court Tuesday included J. M. Tanner, Gaston, J. Kemmer, Beaver-ton, and W. G. Ide, Hillsboro. On the county court are Judge Donald Tompkins and Commissioners H. D. Kerkman and James Lewis.

Hearing for the budget has been set for the latter part of November.
