

### Pupils Told About Schools of Chinese

On Monday morning the pupils of the B. W. Barnes junior high school heard a talk by a Miss Simister, who has been a teacher in the Anglo-Chinese schools of China. Of special interest to the boys and girls was her recital of the school customs of the Chinese. Boys and girls in China attend school from 8 a. m. until 4:30 p. m. on five days a week and until 3 p. m. on Saturday. A query put to the boys and girls on the proposition of having school on Saturday in Hillsboro brought a very emphatic "No."

Junior high students in China study such advanced subjects as trigonometry, she said. It is to be remembered, however, that the average age of junior high students in China is about two years beyond those of the American schools.

Chinese boys and girls wear uniforms to school. It is worthy of note that such schemes have been tried by some public schools in America but the practice was soon discontinued. Miss Simister also stated that the working men and women of China dress in uniforms which do not vary a great deal for the two sexes.

In the conception of the educator today, the curriculum is not static but is always subject to change. This change is not made purely for change sake, but is made as an effort to keep the curriculum in best trim to meet the needs of society. This curriculum broadcast comes each first and third Tuesday of the month at 4 p. m.
