

Hillsboro and Tigard to Tangle Today in Annual Armistice Day Grid Feature

Goodman "11" Seeking Third Straight Win

Football action of an intense variety is promised for this afternoon on the Hillsboro high school field where Coach B. M. Goodman sends his Hillbillies against a tough Tigard eleven in the annual Armistice day gridiron attraction, slated to start at 2 o'clock.

Hillsboro's aggregation will be stepping out in quest of its third consecutive victory of the season, and will face a Tigard team that is rated "stronger than usual" by those who have watched it in action. The Tigers are a team of the spectacular type, specializing in passes as the principal offensive threat, and boasting a strong defensive line.

Hard Game Anticipated

"We look for Tigard to give us a good, tough game," said Coach Goodman, in commenting on the game. "Tigard always does a lot of passing, and will probably employ more than ever this year, since the team has an unusually fine receiver in Morris, a big, husky end." The Hills eleven have yet to drop a decision to Tigard, although the scoreless tie has been marked up in the course of the annual competition. The Blue and White team will be at full strength for today's game, Goodman said.

As an added attraction, the Hillsboro high band will be out in full force this afternoon to provide music between periods, it was announced.

Hillmen Top Sherwood

Goodman's scrapping aggregation ran up its largest score of the season last Friday afternoon when they walked off Sherwood's gridiron to a 20-0 win. A contest played at Sherwood, two of Hillsboro's three touchdowns came after recovery of Sherwood fumbles, with Loren Bronleewe and Wes Ketcham scoring. The other touchdown came when Ed Grogan catapulted over from the Sherwood three-yard line.

Henry Tsugawa, the husky Hillsboro guard, grabbed a Sherwood fumble on the opponents' 34-yard marker early in the first quarter to open the first scoring drive. A series of line plunges put the ball on the one-foot line from where Bronleewe rammed across. Bob Sutherland's suspended pass for point was no good.

Hillsboro scored again in the second quarter after taking a Sherwood punt on the Hilli 42. Goodman's grid legion started a march down the field that was climaxed with a 23-yard pass from Wes Ketcham to Bronleewe, which put the ball on Sherwood's three-yard stripe. Ed Grogan packed the ball into scoring territory on the first attempt, and Henry Tsugawa moved back from guard to crack over the line for the extra point. The score stood that way—13-0—at the half.

Fumbles Count Again

Halfway through the third canto, Ketcham fell on another Sherwood bobble on the 30-yard line. Two first downs carried the ball to the Sherwood three, from where Ketcham romped across for the third touchdown. Jerry V. L. C. added the extra point on Hillsboro's first successful place-kick this year.

The game was marred somewhat by fumbles and penalties with the fumbles going against Sherwood and the penalties against Hilli. The Hillsboro offensive accounted for a dozen first downs, while Sherwood rolled up seven, most of them early in the game.

Two more games remain on the Hillsboro schedule after today's Tigard clash, with Tillamook and Forest Grove on the gridiron menu for successive week-ends. Today's battle offers fans the last chance to see the Blue and White perform on the home field this season.
