

Tigers Downed, 26 to 6, in Armistice Tilt Closing Hilhi's Local Showing

Hilhi Gridmen Beat Tigard Armistice Day

Hilhi's gridmen warriors unlimbered their big guns against Tigard here Thursday afternoon in the annual Armistice day game to roll over the Tigers 26 to 6. Despite the handicap of a slow, sloppy field, the locals turned in their best offensive showing of the year to score twice in the opening moments of play and twice more in the third period.

Tigard's highly touted aerial attack was successfully bottled up until near the end of the game. With only minutes left, the Tigers got their passes clicking against the Blue and White second string to march 34 yards for a touchdown. Grogan runs 52 yards.

Hilhi lost little time in driving for the opening score. Taking the opening kickoff on his own 20, Grogan, Blue and White full, raced upfield 82 yards to put the ball on the Tiger 28. Six drivers netted 20 yards and gave Hilhi a first down on the Tigard eight-yard line. Halfback Bronleeve raced around left end for two and then Grogan fought his way through the center of the line for six more and a score. Again it was Grogan who plunged over for the extra point and Hilhi was away 7 to 0.

Center Churchley gave Hillsboro another scoring opportunity minutes later when he intercepted Altimus pass on the Tiger 28. Again Hilhi started to march. Grogan and Harold Wojahn picked up seven yards in three plays. Harry Wojahn then took a pass from Grogan for a first down on the Tigard 13.

Grogan hit right tackle for four, but on the next play Harold Wojahn

Beavers Win, 13-6 to Clinch 1937 County Crown

A spectacular 88-yard broken field run in the last five seconds of play brought victory and Washington county's 1937 football title to Beaverton high school in an Armistice day clash with Forest Grove on the victor's field last week.
