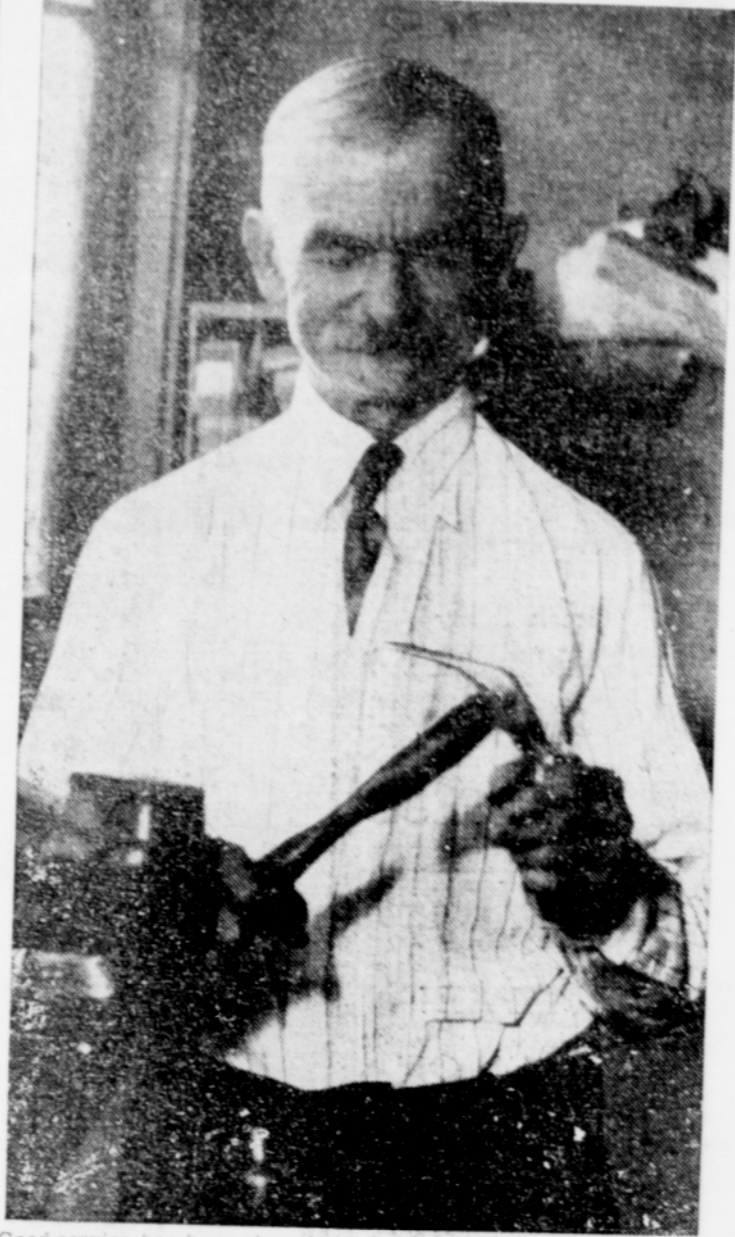


Family Night Program Held at Hazeldale
