

# Blue and White Gridders Hold Strong Tillamook Team, 0 to 0, in Upset

## Hillsboro Ties Cheesemakers in Rainstorm

An underdog Hillsboro high school eleven beat through four fierce quarters of a rain-soaked game at Tillamook last Friday night to wind up with a 0 to 0 tie against one of the state's top-ranking undefeated teams.

Playing on a water-logged turf field in a driving rain, Hillsboro's blue and white smashed every effort of the top-heavy favorites to duplicate the scoreless tie of Astoria against the Cheesemakers several weeks ago. The Hills line, from end to end, was credited with its best performance of the year in stopping the vaunted power attack of the coast school's aggregation. Bonney, Tillamook's star back, was bottled up all evening with the exception of a couple of midfield jaunts of a dozen yards each.

**Fumbles Spoil Chances**

Coach B. M. Goodman's team threw an ironclad defense at the Cheesemakers throughout most of the game, but managed also to do a bit of excellent offense during the course of the game, only to see each of five potential scoring marches terminated via the recovered fumble route. The best offensive effort of the Blue and White team ended on the Tillamook 20-yard mark when the Cheesemakers pounced on an ill-timed fumble.

Tillamook's backs once advanced the ball to the Hillsboro nine-yard stripe, where their best scoring drive ended after only four yards had been gained in four plays. On several other attempts the Tillamook drives were broken up around the 20-yard line. Late in the final quarter, Hillsboro took the ball on the 12 and was set back with a five-yard penalty to the seven. Henry Tsugawa, stocky Japanese guard and signal-caller for the Goodman gridders, eliminated the idea of a punt and directed a drive that took the ball out to the 25 before kick was called. On another occasion Ray Laird intercepted a pass on the 20 to break up a Tillamook drive.

Possessing a tight defense both teams were stymied when aerial attempts in the opening quarter resulted in slippery incompletions of sure-fire passes. Wes Ketcham tossed the water-logged ball to Ed Grogan, who was standing out in the clear, only to see the slimy pigskin slide through Grogan's hands and man what would have been a touch-down on a dry field. Tillamook completed two passes, and then tempted fate by throwing laterals from both, but managed to complete them for fair gains. Hillsboro completed none in five attempts.

**Downs Favor Cheesemakers**

Ground-gaining figures gave Tillamook a slight edge, with eight first downs to a half dozen for Hills. Most of the game became a punting duel, with big Bob Sutherland, Hillsboro's back, doing more than holding his own with the single exception of one blocked kick.

Wes Ketcham very nearly shook himself loose for a touchdown gallop in the third period, but was nabbed by the safety man when a blocker drove his man the wrong way. Ketcham was credited with an outstanding performance in the backfield, with several nice gains and some excellent mudding through broken fields.

Hillsboro was well represented at the game, considering the state of the weather. A good sized crowd viewed Tillamook's last game of the season, with the covered grandstand housing a capacity audience.

## 100 Per Cent Award Given Local Bowlers

First one-hundred per cent commendation certificate awarded a Pacific coast city bowling group will go to the Hillsboro Bowling association, according to a letter received here this week by E. W. Freer, secretary of the Hillsboro association, from E. H. Baumgartner, secretary of the National Bowling Congress.

The hundred per cent certificate indicates affiliation of all leagues under the jurisdiction of the Hillsboro Bowling association with the national organization. In view of the fact that this is Hillsboro's first year of activities in connection with the national congress, as well as being the first coast city to qualify, it is regarded as a remarkable achievement.

### Association Commended

"The commendable record your association established in attaining this goal in its initial affiliation with our organization is certainly a distinct tribute," Baumgartner wrote. "We extend our sincere appreciation to the officers of the Hillsboro Bowling association for the untiring efforts devoted to the cause of organized bowling."

The number of leagues and bowlers represented in the membership of your association compares very favorably with the per capita of bowlers affiliated with the congress in cities of a proportionate population. We believe that Hillsboro is above the average."

The official honormark certificate is expected here soon, while the certificates of league affiliation with the National Bowling congress arrived last week. The coveted certificate is something of a rarity in the northwest, since the secretary of the Portland bowling groups, who has held that post for the past nine years, has yet to see one.

### One League Change Noted

Only one change occurred at the top places of Hillsboro's six bowling leagues during the last week, with the engineers and linemen going into first place in the Peco league for the only alteration in the setup of the last two weeks.

Next Sunday, four Hillsboro teams will invade the Oregon alleys in Portland in a return intercity engagement. Two weeks ago, teams from Portland and Hillsboro broke even in games bowled here. Teams representing Fairway Market and Birdseye Frosted Foods, together with two ladies' teams, will make the Portland trip.
