aid to your postal employees by enabling them to celebrate Christmas in other ways than tramping around delivering late letters and parcels."

Foreign bound mail should be posted immediately, owing to the long sea travel frequently involved and customs inspections abroad. Mailing date to assure reception of packages in Africa and distant countries closed early this week. Mail destined for European countries should be sent right away. McPheeters said.

**Public Co-operation Sought**  
Post offices all over the country will make every effort to handle Christmas mails without congestion and delay," he stated, "but due to the enormous volume this can be done only with the cooperation of the public. Additional help is being arranged for at most post offices, but even with this precaution the post office department cannot guarantee delivery unless mailed in time."

Stickers of the "Do Not Open Till Christmas" variety are permitted on packages going through the mails, but all stickers, seals and decorative additions must be kept off the front of envelopes or the address side of packages due to confusion with the required mail stamps.

**Census Draws to Close**  
Hundreds of unemployment census cards rolled in to the Hillsboro post office this week as the deadline for the specially-conducted survey of all unemployed or partially unemployed was reached. They have been checked in the local post office, McPheeters said, and after being separated into counties and tabulated are being sent on to the Portland post office, where they will be rechecked and sent on to Washington, D. C., where the Bureau of Census of the Department of Commerce will take charge.

Portions of Multnomah and Yamhill counties, in addition to Washington county, are served from the Hillsboro post office, necessitating careful sorting of census cards into proper sections. Reports on the census returns will probably not be available until some time after the first of the year, it was stated, since millions of the cards will have to be checked and tabulated after they reach Washington.
