Grade School Holiday Time Announced

The Christmas vacation for the local grade schools this year will begin on the evening of Thursday, December 23, and will last until Sunday evening, January 2. The announcement of the vacation period this early may help some families in arranging their holiday visits.

Progress reports for the second six weeks' period were distributed to the children Wednesday. This marks the close of the first third of the school year. This part of the year is occasioned by a great many breaks, which are not terminated until after the Christmas holidays.
Standardized reading tests will be given from the second grade through the eighth grade in the district seven schools in the very near future. These tests are for the purpose of discovering the reading ability of each child. Also, some analysis of a child's reading difficulties can be made from his test paper.
The new census report has just arrived in the office. It totals 1297 children between the ages of 4 and 20. This total keeps district seven well up in the first district class.
