Triplets Celebrate Birthday

Ewer Triplets Celebrate 16th Anniversary

ALOHA—The sixteenth birthday anniversary (singular number) of Laura, Florence and Elizabeth Ewer was celebrated in a quiet way at their home November 23. The fame of the "Ewer Triplets" does not diminish with time.

They were born in Portland November 22, 1921, moved to Huber during their first year, and to Aloha at the age of six. The News-Telegram has faithfully followed their history by visiting them once a year and taking their picture.

While they still look enough alike to confuse their most intimate friends, there are some slight differences. Up to their twelfth year their race in physical growth was a tie. Now, at 16, Florence and Laura measure each 5 feet 4 inches in height and Elizabeth 5 feet 2 1/2 inches. Florence weighs 113 pounds, Laura 108 pounds and Elizabeth 106 pounds. Florence's taste runs to reading, Laura's to music and Elizabeth is the ready wit of the trio.

But each triplet is not an individualist. They live, move and have their being as one general personality. Their walk, facial expression, tone of voice and varying moods act in unison.

Mrs. C. E. Barker, their primary teacher, tells this "One of the triplets on leaving the room fell against the door knob. After she returned another one of the triplets left the room and fell against the same door knob. She returned and the third triplet left the room and fell against the door knob. A triplet would never say 'I.' It was always 'We.' 'We can read that.' 'We have a new coat lined with fur.' 'One was absent one day. Another who was present said, 'We couldn't come to-day because we had a bad cold.' They all lost their first tooth on the same day. They think together in 'We.' Their ego is swallowed up in 'We.' These strange mixtures of unity and separation present a fit subject for the psychologist rather than an effort of a hurried half hour of the interviewer's time.

The girls are sophomores in the Beaverton high school. Their musical training begun at a very early age is seriously kept up. Their naturally sweet voices have been cultivated to a high degree by their father, Howard E. Ewer, and Mrs. R. A. Montgomery.

Hillsboro School Census Total 1,294

Boys and girls between the ages of 4 and 20 years in school district No. 7, Hillsboro, total 1,294, an increase of 57 over 1936, according to the school census just completed by Mrs. Mildred Christensen. Of this number 654 are girls and 640 boys. There are 10 handicapped of which only three are receiving instruction by a special teacher.

Increase is due largely to people coming from other states, this being greater than in 1936. The states and number of children from each, between the ages of 4 and 20, are: Nebraska, 25; Kansas, 10; South Dakota, 1; North Dakota, 5; Colorado, 3; Iowa, 13; Wisconsin, 6; Wyoming, 1; Missouri, 4; Idaho, 2; Montana, 1; Minnesota, 5; Washington, 10; California, 11; Canada, 4; total, 114.
