### Social Security Payments Ready for Eligibles

"Some wage earners, who have reached the age of 65 this year and are entitled to a lump-sum of 3 1/2 per cent of wages earned since the first of this year have failed to file claims for these benefits, under the mistaken belief that they must quit work before they can get the money," advised James E. Peebles, manager of the Portland field office Bureau of Old-Age Insurance, Social Security board, recently.

"There is no requirement in the Social Security act that wage earners must quit working before they claim lump-sum payments. Inquiries we receive at our office in the Old Post Office building indicate that a good many workers are making this mistake," he explained. "In case of death a wage earner's estate is given also a lump-sum settlement. The lump-sum payments at 65, and to the worker's estate at death, are figured on the basis of \$35 for each \$1000 wages earned since January 1, 1937, in employment covered by the Social Security act," Peebles added.
