## Bamford Herd Rates Highest in Production in Oregon

C. H. Bamford, high producing herd in the Washington County Herd Improvement association in October, was high among all the herd improvement associations in the state for the month ending October 30.

J. W. Corey's cow No. 10C, a grade Jersey, which was the high producing cow for the month in this county, was second high in the state. It produced 1271 pounds of milk containing 81.3 pounds of fat for the month.

Fir Grove Dairy had the second highest producing cow for the month, No. 7, a grade Holstein, produced 1733 pounds milk, containing 76.3 pounds fat.

Eight hundred and ninety-one cows were tested in the local association during October. The total average per cow for all cows tested during the month was 628 pounds of milk containing 29.3 pounds of fat. Two hundred and thirty-three cows produced each over 40 pounds of fat and 31 herds were tested during the month.

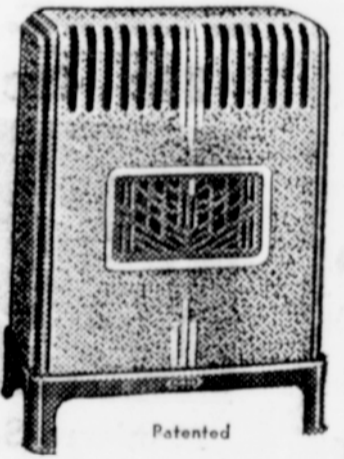
