Friends here of Neal Hodges and John Striffler of Newberg were shocked to hear of their death by drowning Sunday in the Willamette river. Mr. Hodges owned and operated a sawmill in the Buck Heaven district in 1930-31, later moving to his 40 acres of timber in the Pleasant View district. He also had charge of the Pleasant View rock crusher several seasons. John Striffler was usually employed by Mr. Hodges and was at the time of his death. Mr. Striffler lived for a good many years in the Mountain Top district. His widow is a daughter of the late Bill Meyers, an old time Mountain Top resident.

The school house was wired for electricity over the week-end. Lights will be ready for the children's Christmas program December 23.



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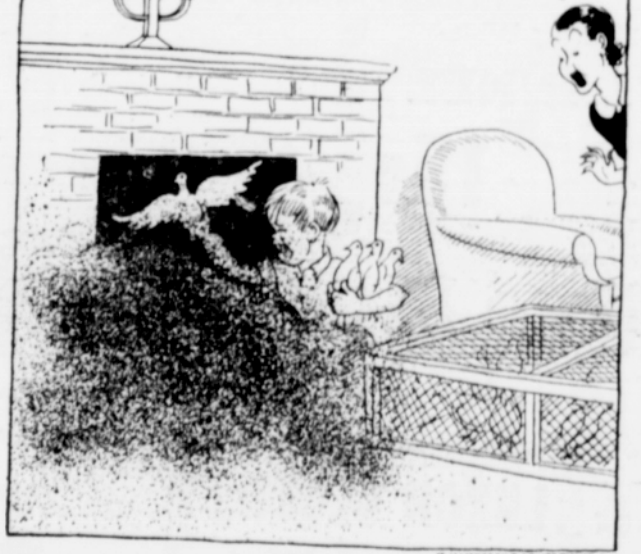
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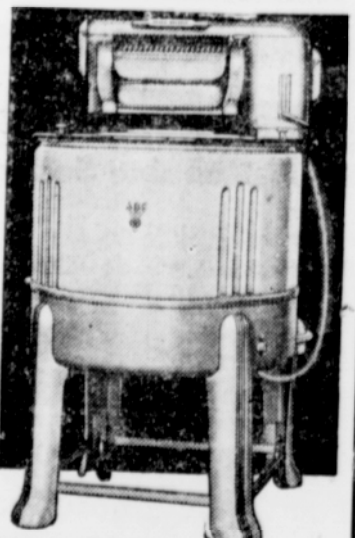
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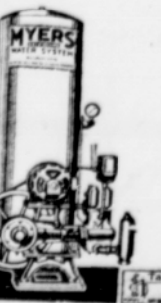


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
