

Tuberculosis Topic at Auxiliary Meeting

Dr. D. C. McDonald, county health physician, discussed tuberculosis, its prevention and treatment at the meeting of the Legion Auxiliary Tuesday evening at the Veterans' hall. He also exhibited slides showing the progress of the disease in the human body. Miss Clara Engbertsen, county health nurse, told of the ways in which the proceeds of the Christmas Seal sale were used to combat tuberculosis. She stated that tuberculosis had dropped from the first place to the seventh in causing deaths. This she said was due to the educational campaign in the care and prevention of tuberculosis made possible by the seal sale. Miss Corlaine Pennington, school nurse, told of the schools in which the organization could assist.

The Christmas seal sale in Hillsboro is being conducted by the Auxiliary, chairman, reported the sale was exceeding expectations.

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22 Districts Send Complete Returns for Seal Sales

Twenty-two districts in Washington county have already sent in full returns on the Tuberculosis Christmas Seal sale. It was reported yesterday by Mrs. Zola Morgan, county seal sale chairman.

All but two of the more than 100 districts in the county have already announced acceptance of their full quota of seals, and in several instances requests for additional supplies of seals have been sent in "From all indications," Mrs. Morgan said, "Washington county will be among the top counties when the annual seal drive is concluded if present enthusiasm continues. People this year seem glad to do their bit to help in such a worthy cause."

One elementary school teacher wrote in "Can you please send out 300 more seals? The children are working very hard and have already disposed of our original allotment."

18th Tentative Deadline

We hope you will complete most of the seal drive by December 18," Mrs. Morgan said, referring especially to the school sections participating in the drive.

This year Oregon has set a goal of six seals per capita. The county quota amounts to nearly 200,000 of the tiny, gaily-colored stickers in the current 1937 drive. Last year's seal sales showed an increase of 13 per cent over 1935, and the hope is held that a similar increase may take place this year. Tuberculosis cases in Oregon jumped somewhat in 1937, with much of the blame laid on the depression, poor food and unsuitable living quarters. Aim of the seal sale is to combat these contributing factors as well as aid those already suffering from the disease.

Tuberculosis seals make attractive decorations for holiday cards and packages. Mrs. Morgan pointed out, adding the warning not to place them on fronts of envelopes or the address sides of packages. By avoiding placing the seals there, all packages and letters will be complying perfectly with post-office department orders, she said.
