

Hilhi Hoopers Prepare for Season Grind

About 40 ambitious high school athletes responded to Coach Reece Hathorn's call at opening turn-out for the Hillsboro high school basketball team last Wednesday afternoon.

Since that time the number in suits has been trimmed to about 25. Hathorn said, and these have been placed on the "A" team under his direction, and the "B" squad, being handled this year by Bill Johnson. Each of the two teams will carry squads of about 10 men through the season, so a few men still remained to be trimmed from the hoop sport roster.

"I'm inclined to be just a bit optimistic," Hathorn said after the first week's work. "The club is working very hard and is rounding into shape rapidly. We may not have the championship team here but the boys have a good chance. Tigard is probably going to fill the role of the thorn in everyone's side, since the Tigers are a full veteran team. Hillsboro will be up near the top in the county standings this year, at any rate."

Trio of Vets Back
Only three veterans have returned from last year's "A" squad to help the new hoop coach's burden in his first year as head basketball mentor. Ed Graham and Fred Baumgarten, both forwards, and Paul Lawrence, a center, are the three returning experienced men.

At present, however, the 12-man "A" squad also lists nine men who have come up from last year's second team, which didn't drop a single decision in a 21-game schedule under Hathorn. Forwards in this classification include Bill Grogan, George Tsugawa and Howard Davis; Bob Nolan, Leron Bronek, Jack Christensen and Don Henningsen, all guards; and Vernon Williams, who is ineligible for play until the start of the second semester on January 14, is a center. Ted Gardner is listed as both a guard and center.
