paralyzing the railroad, no further work was earnestly started by prominent citizens of this community. Archbishop Christie of the Portland diocese gave the right of way for a new road through the hills.

Fifteen hundred dollars was raised by subscription among property owners of Huber, Aloha and Reedville to buy the right of way in three particular tracts. Mr. Mitchell had always taken an active interest in Orenco and was known by everyone who had lived in the community any length of time. In the early days here, he had charge of the general store. He then formed the Orenco Nursery company and in the last few years had built up a large wholesale nursery business in the eastern states and California.

Mr. Mitchell was the first postmaster here and served as a councilman for ten years.

An active interest was always taken by him in the local Presbyterian church and he was the last charter member of the church living in Orenco.

His hobby was the raising of fine pigeons, which won many prizes at the Pacific International Livestock show in Portland. Among other activities, Mr. Mitchell was a director

for a number of years of the pet and stock association.
