Imagine my sorrow when I read of a Thanksgiving tragedy—cheerless shack—alone—and death. Oh, God, be kind; may his soul rest in peace.

If I had known this, would it have made a difference? Or would my hurry workaday life went on in the same way. Or would I have paused to do a kind deed with a Thanksgiving basket—a Christmas greeting or such. I don't mean mere sympathy. No, something deeper. For I was attracted a long time ago, in a human study of the "Man in the Chair." If I had the power I'd like to immortalize him like "The Man with the Hoe."

Sincerely I for one will miss that bit of humanity on Main street. I am thankful for the inspiration sometime ago, when I wrote this poem, the least I can do is submit it, and consider it a tribute to the Man in the Chair.

The man in the chair,
I always find in me there
Somewhere on the street,
I'd like to speak when we meet;
But what would I say?
Words of sympathy to brighten his way?

Electric Appliance Purchases Helped

The Electric Home & Farm Authority announces that effective immediately a program will be inaugurated for bringing low-cost federal financing to purchasers of household and farm electrical equipment throughout the 2600 square-mile territory served by the Portland General Electric company, according to Henry D. Britton, Washington, D. C.

The plan of the E. H. & F. A. is available only in regions where electric utility rates are sufficient low to make the use of major appliances feasible for the average family.

The Authority has been successful in obtaining the full co-operation of the Portland General Electric company in acting as its fiscal agent in making the new finance plan available to its customers through appliance dealers in this region.

This is the first contract to be made by the E. H. & F. A. in the Pacific Northwest.

This plan enables customers of the Portland General Electric company to purchase major electric appliances from retail dealers at down payments as low as five per cent and with long terms. Monthly installments on appliances purchased from dealers are payable to the utility at the same time the electric service bills are due. These payments are credited to the customer's account and forwarded to the Electric Home & Farm Authority.

House Built '54 Still Standing

ALOHA—John Kykendall built the house on the A. J. Masters' donation land claim near Reedville in 1854. This house is still standing and is occupied by the Theodore J. Nault family as a farm home. The lumber was all dressed by hand and at that time it was one of the finest houses on the Tualatin Plains. The weather-boarding and ceiling lumber was sawed out of clear cedar and is still a part of the building.

Quoting John Masters, son of A. J. Masters: "Yes, the pioneers had a hard time of it. Dad and mother crossed in 1843. The Indians weren't bad that year, but the wild animals made it kind of uncomfortable for them. That winter dad spent most of his time working in falling trees. Mother tells one story about an evening when she was left alone, with dad miles away, panthers and other wild animals growled outside the cabin. They struck their long hoses through the cracks in the walls and shrieked like a million boiler factories. Mother took the poker and burned their noses. Then they would howl and growl and another stick his nose through."

An inventory of the estate of A. J. Masters made February 27, 1857, showed a farm containing 340 acres of land with dwelling house, barn and other improvements valued at four thousand dollars.
