Mrs. Anna Grand was born in the village of Trimmis, Canton of Graubunden, Switzerland, nestling in the narrow Rhine river valley over which towered the mountains glistening with snow many months in the year. Her birthplace was a two-story stone house of six large rooms with walls three feet thick. Seven community wells supplied the water for the 107 families of Trimmis.

Her father, as the other villagers, eked out a living from his small flock of sheep and a herd of a few cows. His land consisted of a few scattering patches of fertile and verdant Rhine valley. A well-to-do farmer might own eight cows, two oxen and a horse or two. The combined flock of sheep of the village was not more than sixty.

The nearest neighboring village was distant, as Mrs. Grand expressed it, "about one and one-half hour's walk." Or, distance would be estimated as so many "mountains away." Asked what were her amusements in childhood, she listed them in this order: work, dancing, skiing, skating, tobogganning and apple-peeling parties. Her father made the children's skis and toboggans.

Her schoolhouse was a three-story stone building. Pupils' ages ranged from seven to fifteen. After completing the seventh grade her brother entered a military school. She knew of no girl in the village who carried her academic training beyond the elementary school or the seventh grade. Beside the three R's she was instructed in sewing, knitting, ironing and singing. In her girlhood she never saw a woman teacher. Religious training was given regularly by the different religious denominations in the community. Pure German was the language of the school, but the Swiss dialect
