

### Newberg Team Admitted to County League

Washington county's six-team high school basketball league became a seven-team circuit and reached into neighboring Yamhill county last Wednesday for another entry, with the Newberg quintet added as the result of a special mid-week session of principals of the six county schools.

The Newberg aggregation, dropped from the league competition when McMinnville and other teams banded together in the formation of a stronger Willamette valley high school conference, sought admission to the county league. Other teams making up the circuit are Forest Grove, Beaverton, St. Mary's, Sherwood, Tigard and Hillsboro, all of which are located within the Washington county limits.

Enlargement of the league has made necessary the re-aligning of the circuit schedule somewhat, according to Reece Hathorn, Hillsboro mentor, but plans for the county opener at St. Mary's on Friday, January 7, will remain virtually the same. Six short games will be played that night, Hathorn said, with every one of the seven league teams appearing at least once. The teams appearing in the night's final game will have played at least three of the short games to reach that position, since the opener will be conducted along tournament lines, with the losers of each short game dropping from the evening's competition. The opener is expected to provide a good opportunity for sizing up the relative strength of the various teams, it was declared.

One of the best pass catchers on the squad, Dick came in for a good share of playing time this year when other ends were benched with injuries and Coach Stiner was forced to alternate his men in their playing condition. A good end has to be fast on offense and able to diagnose enemy plays to be successful, and many of the local followers of the game have complimented Dick by saying he had "everything" required of a great end. He will be sorely missed when Stiner attempts to build another challenger for the 1938 conference race.

**Starred in U. S. C. Game**  
In Los Angeles when the Beavers were playing the Trojans, Sutherland really proved that he could "hold up in the pinches" when he went into the game in place of Don Coons who was injured. Everyone expected it to be the "end" when Coons left the game, but Dick played the best game of his career with a faultless performance both defensively and offensively which drew him a great deal of favorable comment in the Los Angeles newspapers.

During the season, Dick was the chief alternate wingman, doing equally well at either left or right end, although he saw most of his action at the left end. He was on the side-lines a good part of the time with an ankle ailment.

### County Youth May Be Beaver Regular

Harvey Storey of Forest Grove, former Pacific University baseball star, will make his Coast league debut as a regular for the Portland Beavers next season, if present rumors emanating from the offices of the club are correct.

Storey, who slithered opposing pitchers with a .347 batting mark in the Western International league during the 1937 season, was farmed out to the Tacoma club by the Beavers last year. He is counted upon as a replacement for Fred Bedore, aging Beaver third-sacker, according to reports. Although listed as a third baseman, Storey turned in his best fielding marks last year while stationed at shortstop, but his batting power is rated as his main asset.

**Six Teams Planned for County Loop**  
Schedules for the Washington county basketball league was announced next week according to Dr. A. W. Abrams, league director.

Six teams will make up the league this year, with teams qualified from Orengo, Banks, Gaston, Beaverton and Tualatin. A twice-a-week schedule is being drawn up for the teams, with one home game and one visiting game on each team's schedule each week. The first two rounds will be completed about the first of February, constituting the first half play. The second half will get under way immediately, with a three-game titular playoff slated for mid-March, with a special trophy going to the league champion.

### New '38 Fords Go on Display

Ford V-8 models for 1938, featuring two distinct lines, went on display this morning (Thursday) at the showroom of the MacKenzie Motor company, Hillsboro Ford dealer.

Standard model available in three body styles and powered with either the 85 or 60-horsepower V-8 engine, is designed for maximum economy in first cost and operation. The front end of the standard line forms a "V" with the horizontal grille bars extending unbroken along the hoodside to form the louvers.

The newly-designed deluxe line is powered with the 45-horsepower V-8 motor and is available in eight body types. Hood on the deluxe is lengthened, its nearly vertical front is carried in a "V" well down into the radiator grille. Horizontal line of the grille bars, and the louvers are echoed in a rustless steel band along the belt to the rear.

Fenders in both cars are mass-produced for easy removal to provide more complete coverage of the running gear. Headlamps are recessed in front fender aprons on both models. Interiors of both are roomy and attractive and a new instrument panel is added to the finish of the cars.

One of the new features is the front seat of the Tudor sedans. The seat cushion is full width, seat backs are divided so that they may swing inward as well as forward.

### Bakers Vanquish Oregon City, 52-31

Perfection Bakers hammered out a 52 to 31 win over an Oregon City team on the local high school floor last Friday night, with Warren Wahner and Peterson leading the Hillsboro team's attack.

Both Wahner and Peterson piled up 18-point totals, both representing the local high school floor during the coming week, according to Keith Wilcox, manager of the bakery squad. At present the Hillsboro entry stands at a 500 mark, the Big-3 league, having edged out a 40 to 37 victory over the Pacific "U" superstars in their opening contest, and dropped a 60 to 35 decision to the Newberg Tavert team. Warren Wahner rang up 19 counters in the Pacific game.

### Mail Contracts Are Announced

Four-year contracts for star mail routes will be awarded early next year by the United States Postoffice Department, according to L. T. McPeeters, Hillsboro postmaster, with one Hillsboro route being affected.

Present course of the Hillsboro-Scottfield-Jablonki road star route is through North Plains, Roy, Banks and Buxton to the Jablonki road junction several miles beyond Buxton and return. McPeeters said. Star routes are for the purpose of transporting mail between the small post offices and the central station, with some box delivery service rendered in outlying districts not served by general mail routes. Ten miles of this rural service in the direction of Manning will be added to the Hillsboro route under terms of the new contract, it was announced.

**Bids Close January 25**  
Bids on the contract will be received at Washington, D. C., until 4:30 p. m., January 25, 1938. Decision on the contracts will be made on or before March 8, 1938, with a new contract going into effect on July 1. Present contracts run until June 30, and the new contract will be awarded for the four-year period ending June 30, 1942.

Those interested in bidding on the route are urged to make inquiries at the Hillsboro post office. McPeeters said. Before bidding, each person should familiarize himself with the full details of the work required. Additional information on the contracts, together with blanks for bids, are available there.

### Railroad Assumes Delivery Service

Assumption of full duties in connection with store-door pickup and delivery service soon after the first of the year was announced recently by the Southern Pacific railroad company.

On all intrastate traffic involving pickup and delivery service in the past, the railroad's subsidiary, Pacific Motor Transport, has been called upon to do the work. Rates and service will remain unchanged, the only difference being in the change of name, it was announced. The change will eliminate the inconvenience to shippers of using different tariffs and billing documents for intrastate traffic work, which has always been handled under the Southern Pacific name, and intrastate shipping.

### Migraine Headache Cure Discovered

CORVALLIS—That the "water balance" in a person's body may be the key to prevention of migraine or nervous sick headache is the theory advanced by Frank Thompson, graduate student in chemistry at Oregon State college, who recently reported his experiments and conclusions on this subject to the Oregon section of the American Chemical society at its meeting in Portland.

When informed about eight years ago that this malady from which he suffered frequently, and which, incidentally, afflicts from one to two per cent of the population, was incurable, Thompson began using his earlier scientific training in an effort to find out something about it for himself. His study of his own case and those of a number of others has finally convinced him that the secret of prevention of these headaches lies in keeping the intake of water or liquid at a minimum.

He recommends that persons subject to such headaches stay on the

borderline of thirst at all times, and that if they feel an attack coming on, wrap themselves in blankets in the warmest possible spot and sweat it out.
