### "Custer's" Sword Displayed; West's History Recalled

Stirring drama of the Old West was called to mind this week at the sight of an old, badly-pitted and rusted remnant of a cavalry officer's saber brought in to the Argus office by C. A. White.

Initials "G. W. C." are discernible on the brass hilt of the old sword, indicating possibly that it belonged at one time to General George Custer, famed Indian fighter, who met death along with 264 of his force when ambushed by 6000 Indians at the juncture of the Big Horn and Little Horn rivers in Dakota in 1876.

The sword was picked up on the site of the battle in 1910. White said he has long been interested in gathering souvenirs and records of Indian and western history, and has a letter from Carl Gray, recently-retired president of the Union Pacific.

Several gold-plated buttons gathered on the old Fort McPherson parade ground, together with two large rattles from Texas rattle-snakes, and the "Custer" sword, are on display in the Argus window this week.
