

Non-Supporter Gets Year Term Here Tuesday

Joseph W. Poffenberger, 61, was given a sentence of one year in the county jail in circuit court Tuesday, having been booked on a charge of non-support and violation of the court order for the support.

Sentence of Thorn Kohlegard, charged with obtaining money under false pretenses, was postponed until some time in the future on the condition that he make restitution on all bad checks and maintain a good record for the future. He was ordered to report to the district attorney once each month for the next three months.

The third jury trial in as many weeks in Justice A. W. Havens' court here Monday resulted in an acquittal for Robert W. Ramsdell of Portland, who had been charged with reckless driving. The sentence of Calvin Birkett of Forest Grove, brought before the justice court on a charge of intoxication and disturbing the peace, was postponed, while George Link of Hillsboro, found guilty on the same charge, was fined \$10 and costs.
