Reece "Happy" Hathorn had reason to be a bit cheerful last Friday night as his Hilli court warriors pounded their way to a 26-18 victory over McMinnville in their first clash against high school competition.

Paced by Bill Grogan, who rang up eight points, the Hilli boys turned on the heat in the second half, after trailing 14 to 12 at the half-way mark. Working on the assumption that a "good offense is the best defense," the Hilli men monopolized use of the ball during the last two periods, allowing only four points throughout the entire half. Keider, Mac forward, was high-point man for the game, with 10 points, but the rest of the McMinnville attack was stifled throughout the game. Loren Brunewick ranked second with seven points for Hilli.

Three Blue and White hoopers sank half-dozen foul shots in 11 attempts, while the Mac casaba experts hit only four in 13 tries.

In a preliminary game, the McMinnville "B" squad swapped the Hilli second stringers, 29 to 9. The clash marked the Hilli "B" squad's first game together.

Mrs. A. Johnson, who has been with her daughter, Mrs. S. Olson, went to Canby December 12 to make her home with her son.

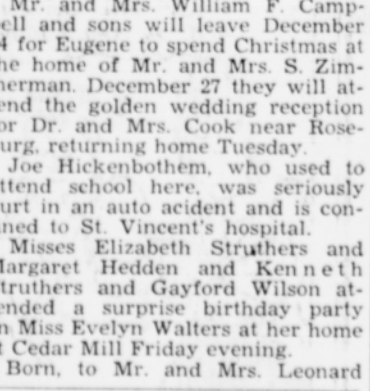

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World's Busiest Street?



JUST LOOK at that traffic roaring by! Yes, sir, that's New York's famous Fifth Avenue looking toward 42nd Street. And the lady in the stylish white shirtwaist and the snappy little straw skimmer had better be careful when she gets to the corner, because you know how those horseless carriage drivers swing around the turns. With the national automobile show approaching, Consumer Information dug out this picture, taken in 1907, to show what a difference 30 years can make. The picture below shows Fifth Avenue as it is today. Advertising, which created the demand, and research, which perfected the



product, are credited with changing the picture from that of 1907, when only a few thousand cars were on the country's roads, to that of today, with almost 30,000,000. The few small manufacturers of 30 years ago advertised to sell their primitive cars, which cost around \$3,000 for a "medium-priced" model. They created a bigger demand than they could fill, and so bigger factories, increased employment, and constantly better automobiles resulted. And today we can buy an infinitely superior car for about one-fifth of the price, while half a million men are directly employed in the industry, compared to a few thousand at the time this picture was taken.
