

Importance of Women's Clubs Cited Scholls

SCHOLLS—The recent revision of certain laws by the government, were cited as proof of the great strength of women's clubs, when united in one great organization by Mrs. Olin J. Hosford, first vice-president of the Oregon Federation of Women's Clubs, in an address before the Scholls group Tuesday.

Mrs. Hosford pointed out that many small clubs make up the National Federation, and recognition hard to gain, by the smaller units, is easily found by the national group. From a few scattered clubs of a few years ago, has grown an organization that has spread throughout our country and the world until there are only two countries where women are not privileged to meet and discuss their problems with other women. The federation is now sponsoring a course in mothercraft in some of the major public schools and has had written, and printed, one book on the subject. She stressed the work of the various clubs of the country in beautification of highways and parks, and in many phases of educational matters. A meeting of the Junior Club women of the third district was announced for Portland during February.

Requirements of the applicants for the scholarship loan funds were explained and Mrs. Hosford stated that 1565 girls had received this aid from the Oregon fund, which has grown by means of the small contributions, to the sum of \$46,000.

Mrs. Bardi Skelason, chairman of fine arts for Oregon, spoke on work in this line.

Wilmer Hansen, who is employed at The Dalles, was home for the week-end visiting friends and relatives.

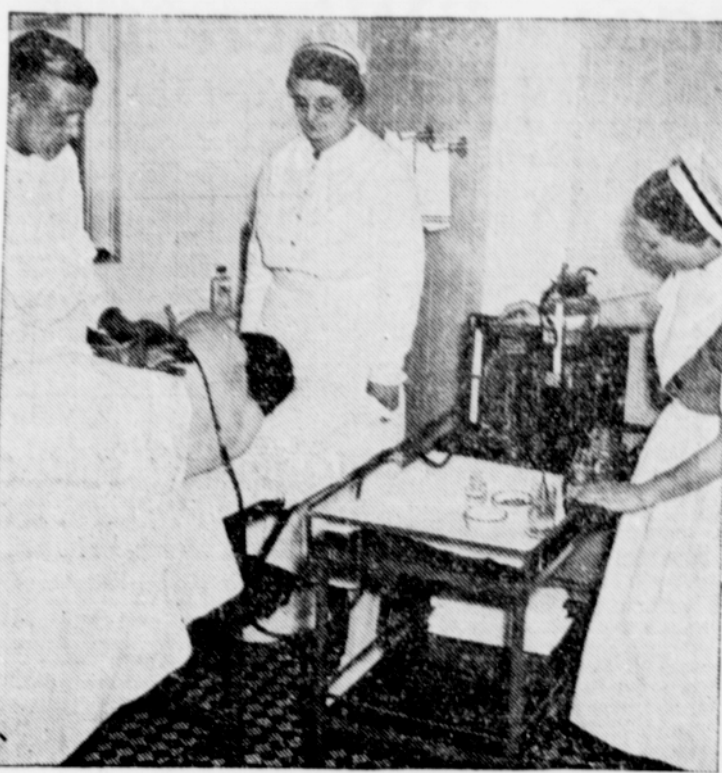
The Midway corner is being improved by C. A. Amittage on the old Carl Carlson place. They are remodeling the buildings into a store and gas and oil station.

Resting the Lung by Injecting Air



This patient is receiving pneumothorax treatment for tuberculosis, a painless method used widely in this country since 1912. Pneumo means air and thorax refers to the chest, and the procedure is to inject a gas into the space between the chest wall and outer surface of the lung. By this process the infected lung is put to rest, thereby restricting respiration to the healthy lung. When tuberculosis is discovered in its early stages pneumothorax treatment can save thousands of lives.

Many men and women today are back at work, healthy and useful, because they can go to their doctors periodically and receive "refills" of air. Pneumothorax is one of the modern weapons advocated by the National Tuberculosis Association and its 2,000 affiliated state and local associations. Their educational campaign is financed by Christmas Seals sold during Thanksgiving and Christmas.
