

### Hillsboro Phone Changes Due Near Future

Installation of new telephone equipment and remodeling of present exchange building quarters on South Second street will begin shortly after the first of the year, it was announced this week by George Bauman, manager of the West Coast Telephone company for this area.

The whole telephone building will hereafter be occupied and used by the company, Bauman said. A large portion of the building has been used in the past by J. O. Hobbs who moved to his new office building two weeks ago, thus enabling the telephone company to begin its remodeling campaign. It was previously announced that plans for the improvement of the exchange will call for an expenditure of approximately \$30,000. Switch board capacity will be doubled, Bauman announced.

Complete new central office equipment is to be installed, and rebuilding of the outside plant is also planned. Details of the work will not be known until the new switchboard arrives from the manufacturer, Bauman explained, since the work to be done will depend to a great extent upon the type of the new apparatus. Completion of the remodeling will give Hillsboro phone users a greatly speeded service, it was declared.

### Former Senator Buried at Grove

Funeral services for ex-Senator Loring V. Stewart, formerly of Forest Grove, 65, who died December 19 while visiting at Toledo, were held Wednesday at the Forest Grove Undertaking company chapel. Holbrook Masonic lodge was in charge of services and interment was in Forest View cemetery.

Senator Stewart was born at Yamhill October 22, 1872, and was a graduate of Pacific university. He received his law degree from Yale university. As joint senator, representing Grant, Malheur and Harney counties, he served in the Oregon legislature from 1913 to 1917. His late residence was at Dayville, where he had engaged in farming.

Instructions in the river which would have retained the greater portion of it. In clearing up the Tualatin flood control project, it will be necessary to remove the dam and replace it with a movable one, and to eliminate the other channel obstructions which would impound the water.

Irrigation Matters Helped

Pictures of various phases in the Willamette valley project were shown at the conclusion of Rand's talk, including the sites for several flood-control and irrigation dams which will number 15 by the time the \$56,000,000 valley project is completed and will generate as much electrical energy as the Bonneville dam.

This area, Rand said, has too much water in the spring and not enough during the summer. Northern plains states have their heaviest precipitations of the year during June, July and August, while during those same months in this section of the country has been the driest portion of the United States during that period. An irrigation-value chart showed that irrigated crops produced an average of 51.7 per cent more than the unirrigated crops. Several projects planned will enable carrying on of more irrigation work.
