(Continued from page 1) After a while in the hospital, he was dismissed by physicians who gave him but a short time to live. That was a little over 75 years ago, in the course of the battle, he received a number of broken ribs and his head was considerably cut up, so with that his active participation in the bloody struggle ended in 1862.

On November 8, 1865, Wadsworth arrived in Portland. In 1880, he was named to the state legislature from Benton county. From 1883 to 1887 he was Indian agent on the Siletz agency, with more than 600 Indians under his guidance.

Graveside services were held at Toledo, Tuesday afternoon. Young's Funeral Home of Hillsboro was in charge of funeral arrangements.
